Over 300 years ago the three Romeyn brothers arrived in New Amsterdam. By the time of the War of 1812 this spelling among descendants was rare. Recently a search of City Directories of the entire U.S. at the Library of Congress revealed a relatively small number with the spelling Romeyn. Most use the spelling Romine and in some areas there are a number with the added "s". During the transition period several spellings were in use and the literature of the day might use 2 or 3 spellings of a proper name in one paragraph. That custom will be noted in quotations used in this book. We have made every effort to quote precisely and usually the text is reproduced exactly--including errors in spelling. We can only conjecture on the number of descendants today--there are many thousands.

This is The Romine Family, Book I. In about a year we hope to have completed The Romine Family, Book II. This will include War Service Records of the Revolutionary War (Book I has the three pension records), the War of 1812, Mexican and Indian Wars, the Civil War, more census reports, and additional marriage records. Much other data is in hand at this writing and excluded due to lack of space.

Some of the quotations in this book will recapture for you a bit of the flavor of New Amsterdam and New York during the early days. You will catch a glimpse of the "church on the green"--one of the "churches without chimneys." In fantasy you will follow the Romine pioneers as they journeyed by horseback over the Great Indian Warpath through Lancaster, Pa., Hagerstown, Md., down to Winchester, Va. (Frederick Co.) and Loudoun Co., Va. in the mid 1700's. The focus of attention will be Peter Romine as he purchases for 2 shillings 6 pence two acres of land for the Ketoctin Baptist Church in Loudoun County, and pays yearly (when lawfully demanded) the "Rent of one Ear of Indian Corn." Peter and Abigail were the leading members there. This is validated by the listing of their names following the name of the pastor in reports of Committee meetings, etc.; this is the "Baptist Way" we are told by the Secretary of the Virginia Baptist Historical Society. You will see the horses saddled again as Romines move down the Shenandoah Valley--some dwelling here for a few years--and thru the Cumberland Gap via the Wilderness Road into Tennessee and Kentucky. You will see some moving into western Virginia, now West Virginia, and many others journeying into Ohio. Some of the adventurers followed the Ohio River to the Mississippi, and an early waterways trek took Romines to St. Louis Co., Mo. Throughout the journeyings "records" were left behind, and as we study the Court House Records, Church Records, and the literature of the day we gather clues to our ancestry.

For a fascinating study of the early emigrant trails, such as the Great Indian Warpath; The National Road (now Route 40), The Great Trail, The Wilderness Road, etc., we refer you to the National Genealogical Society Special Publication No. 3, 1962, "Early Emigrant Trails in the United States East of the Mississippi River," by Marcus W. Lewis, available thru the Society at 1921 Sunderland Pl., N.W., Washington, D.C., price \$2. Included is a map of the trails. The reasons for the constantly recurring names (such as Peter and Samuel) is very aptly discussed in another publication of the Society, #12, "Dutch Systems in Family Naming, New York--New Jersey," by Rosalie Fellows Bailey, 1954, price \$1.

Assembled in this book are the "makings" of many family lines. Buried "clues" abound, needing an interested person with a controlled imagination to "mine" them. The inventories give us an idea of the items necessary for a farm family in "Ole Virginny" 200 and 100 years ago. The index, in a separate volume, will prove invaluable. Our search is not over. The history of the Romine family is broader and deeper than the confines of this book. We especially welcome information regarding family Bibles and mementoes.

Several persons have inquired if the compiler of this Romine history is a Romine descendant. My maternal grandfather was Perry Romine, a resident of Allen County, Indiana for many years. Perry's parents were Ross and Almeda (McMillan) Romine.

Romeyn, a descendant, says Claes emigrated at first from Holland to Brazil; and thence to New Netherlands in 1661, settling at first at New Amersfoort (Flatlands), afterwards at Hackensack, N.J., and finally at Greenwich, where he died. JACOBUS (STOFFELSE), left Gravesend and settled near Freehold, N.J., where he had a son Christoffel bp 10-8, 1721.

JAN CLAESON, Mar. May, 1699, Lammetje Bougaert. Left Flatlands and settled in the vicinity of Freehold, N.J., and member of Freehold R.D. Church in 1711, as per page 28 of Brick Church memorial, on which his wife is entered as Geertje Van Dyck (doubtless a 2d wife). Issue:- Klaes, bp 1700, mar. Elizabeth Outwater; Jan, bp 1703, m. Catrina Outwater; Steintie, bp 1705; Roelof, bp 1708, m. Annetjen Freeland; (suppose) Theodorus, mar. Margaret de Bane; David, bp 1714, m. Agnietje Westervelt; Isack, bp 1716, m. Osseltjen Casparus Westervelt; Angenietje bp 1718 m. Isaac Stagge, and Cristina, b. 1723, m. David Barden.

STOFFEL JANSEN, emigrated in 1653, m. Mar. 17, 1678, Grietje Pieterse Wyckoff; d. about 1709, judging from an entry in the Marlboro church records of New Jersey, of Geertje wid. of Stoffel Romeyn having bought in 1709, of R. Salter, 17 A. for the use of the Freehold R.D. church, of which church in 1711 she appears on the list of members as per page 24 of Brick Church Memorial. His name appears on the ass. rolls of Flatland of 1675 and '76, and in 1677 he was a mem. of the church of said town. In 1687 he took the oath of allegiance in Gravesend. In 1693 his name appears on the ass. rolls of New Utrecht, and in 1698 on the census of Gravesend, where he bought land of his brother, Claes, and of which place he was appointed lieutenant in 1689. April 1, 1703, he bought of John Verkerk a farm of 100 A in the village of New Utrecht,

of which he was assessed 98 A in 1706, and which he sold July 20, 1708, to Andrew Emmans of Gravesend for 550 Pounds, as per p. 339 of Lib. 2 and p. 128 of Lib 4 of conveyances. Issue:- Lysbeth, bp Feb. 16, 1679, at Flatbush; Grietje, bp Aug. 29, 1680, at Flatbush; Annetje, bp July 9, 1682, at Brooklyn; Cornelis, bp March 9, 1684, at Brooklyn; and Jacobus. Signed his name "Stoffel Jansen Romeyn" and sometimes "Stoffel Jansen." Stoffel Jansen, Claes Jansen, and Symon Jansen Romeyn, all sons of Jan, as their names indicate, most probably were brothers and came to this country together.

SYMON JANSEN, born in 1629, emigrated from Amsterdam probably in 1653, and married Jan. 1, 1671, in N.Y., Sophia Jans. Settled at first in New Amsterdam, and then in Flatland, where his name appears on the ass. rolls of 1675, and where in 1664 he made an affidavit relating to Capt. Scott's raid, as per p. 482 of Vol. II of Doc. of Col. His. He also in 1664, after the conquest of the colony, took the oath of allegiance in N.Y. to the English. In 1680 he bought lands in Bergen County, New Jersey, as per page 69 of Winfield's Land Titles of Hudson Co., to which he probably eventually removed. Mar. 1, 1680-1, he conveyed to Adriaen Van Laer a house and lot in Flatland, giving his residence as in the city of New York, as per p. 47 of Lib. A of Flatbush records. Signed his name "Symon Jansen Romeyn" and sometimes "Symon Jansen." No account of his descendants.

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Romeyn, James A. The Romeyns, Romaines, and Romaines, of Bergen County claim to be of Italian lineage, which they trace to one Giacomo de Ferentino, an Italian gentlemen who settled at Rongham Manor, Norfolk-shire, England, in the early part of the 13th century and married an English lady, Isabella de Rucham, by whom he had issue 2 sons, one of whom was Peter. This Peter was sent to Rome to be educated and on his return took the surname of Romaeyn (Peter the Roman). He married a daughter of Thomas de Leicester. Many of Peter's descendants became noted men in England, one of them, Jan Romeyn, went from England to the low countries (Holland) and settled in Amsterdam. He had several children, among whom were Claes Jansen, Simeon Jansen, and Christofer Jansen. Claes and Christofer sailed from Rotterdam, Holland, to Brazil, as members of an expedition to that country commanded by Prince Maurice of Nassau. Soon after arriving in Brazil that country was ceded to Portugal, and thereupon the two Romeyns sailed for America. There is a disagreement as to the date when they arrived, but it was probably about 1661. They settled first at New Amersfoort, L.I. Christopher married in 1678 Grietie Pieters Nyckoff, and settled in Monmouth County, N.J.

Claes married (it is said) May 2, 1680, Syntie Alberts Terhune, and in 1690 went to Hackensack, where he bought 4 Indian fields between the Saddle River and the Hackensack River, called in his deed Wierimus, Paskack, Gemagkie, and Marroasonek. These 4 tracts were north of Paramus on the east side of the Saddle River. He did not locate on these lands, but returned to New York, and located in the Greenwich district of the city, where he died. His children, to whom he devised all his lands on his death, divided them into farms and mutually released or sold to actual settlers. Claes Janssen's children of the second generation were:

Jan Claas Romeyn (2) married in May, 1690, Janettie Bogert, at Hackensack and resided on part of his father's lands. He was a member and church master of the "Church on the Green" in 1715. His issue of the 3d generation were:

Nicholas Romeyn (3), baptized at Hackensack in February, 1699, mar. in 1726 Elizabeth Outwater, who died in 1732. He died in 1763. He mar. (2) Rachel Vreeland, who died in 1761. The issue of Nicholas Romeyn (3) and his two wives of the 4th generation were Rev. Thomas Romeyn and John Romeyn.

Rev. Thomas Romeyn (4) born at Pompton, N.J. 3-2-1729, died 10-22-1794. He was graduated from the College of N.J. in 1750, studied theology, and after preaching a few times on L.I. went to Holland, in 1752, for ordination, and was settled at Jamaica, L.I., until 1790. He married (1)

6-29-1756, Margaretta Frelinghuysen, who died at Jamaica, 12-13-1757. He married (2) Susanna Van Campen. He died at Tonda, N.Y. 10-22-1794, and was buried there under the pulpit of his church. The issue of the 5th generation were 7:

Rev. James Van Campen Romeyn (5) was born at Minsink, Sussex Co., N.J. 11-15-1765, and died at Hackensack, 6-27-1840. He attended Schenectady Academy in 1784, studied theology under Rev. Theodore Romeyn, his uncle, was a trustee at Rutgers College, and preached at several places, the last in the Reformed Church of Hackensack and Schraalenbergh from 1799 to 1833. He married (1) Susanna Maud Van Franken, of Schenectady, and (2) Elizabeth Fell, who survived him. His issue of the 6th generation were:

Rev. James Romeyn (6) was born at Blooming Grove, N.J., 9-30-1797, and was graduated from Columbia College in 1816 and from the Theological Seminary, New Brunswick, N.J. in 1819. He declined the Doctor of Divinity degree bestowed on him by Columbia College. He preached at several places, was pastor of the old "Church on the Green" at Hackensack from 1833 to 1836, and was a Trustee of Rutgers College in 1842. He married Joanna Bayard Rodgers, daughter of John R. B. Rodgers, M.D., of Columbia College, N.Y. 5 children of the (7)th generation were:

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AN ORDINANCE FOR THE BAKERS, ACCORDING TO WHICH TO BAKE THEIR BREAD

One whole wheaten loaf must weigh	8 pounds
One half ditto	4 pounds
One whole rye loaf	8 pounds
One half ditto	4 pounds
One white loaf of ten stivers	2 pounds
One ditto five stivers	1 pound

Rolls or Rusks (achterlingen) must weigh two pounds and not less; halves in proportion and all this until further order; and N. N.

is hereby ordered by Schout, Burgomasters and Schepens of this City to regulate himself accordingly on the penalty pursuant to Placard, and to mark his baked bread with a particular mark, on the forfeiture of the bread, which shall be found unmarked together with a fine of twenty five guilders; and further to bring to the Secretary of this City, within three times four and twenty hours the stamp, with which he intends to mark his bread. Done at Amsterdam in New Netherland in the Court of Schout, Burgomasters and Schepens, at the City Hall the 25th March 1661.

Page 389 This day, 21st October 1661. is the following Placard concerning the bakers, read out from the front of this City Hall, after the usual ringing of the bell.

Schout, Burgomasters and Schepens of the City of New Amsterdam in New Netherland. To all those you which see or head this read, Health! Be it known, that for the renewal of the frequently enacted Placards and Ordinances of the Rt. Hon. Director General of N. Netherland and

specially in date 26th October 1661. Regarding the baking and selling of coarse and white bread both of proper weight and suitable dollar, which, on the contrary is mostly baked from bran and sold, against which being desirous to provide they hereby order and command, that all bakers and those who make a trade of baking and selling bread, for the convenience of the Burghers and inhabitants coarse bread; whoever manifests an indisposition herein is hereby forbidden for trade for one year and six weeks; and the same shall be baked and sold at the following prices.

Bread sold of a lighter weight, or without the knowledge, order or consent of this W. Court being lighter in weight or higher in price shall be forfeited, and in addition a fine of twenty five pounds flemish for the first time; for the second time double that sum and for the third time, one hundred pounds flemish with absolute prohibition of trade. Further, no bakers, nor any who make a trade of baking coarse or white bread to sell to Christians, mix in whole or in part, any sifted bran in the coarse bread, but shall bake coarse loaf as it comes from the mill, nor bake any sort of coarse or white bread for Christians except

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as hercainbefore specified under a penalty as before, the inspection thereof remaining to the judicature of this W: Court and those whom they adjoined into themselves as having better knowledge of bread, and thereunto by special charge and order have authorized, namely the persons: --Hendrick Willemsen, baker, and Christoffel Hooghland. They interdict and forbid them, from now henceforth, to bake any more "Koeckges," jumbles, or sweet cake on forfeiture thereof, and additional penalty of fifty guilders. And that all be better obeyed and observed, we authorize and qualify our Officer herein to pay short and strict attention, and duly to proceed against the contraveners. Thus done, resumed and enacted in our Court, in New Amsterdam, in N. Netherland, the 21. October, A.1661.

Page 228 Tuesday, 12 October 1660 In the City Hall

Grietje Pieters, pltf. v/s Jan Eraat, deft.

Plft. wants to know, what claim deft. has against her, inasmuch as she accounted for the linen according to order. Deft. says, she accounted only for $10\frac{1}{4}$ ells and there is not sufficient linen for him to get six shirts from. Pltf. says, she had no more linen from him. Deft. answers, that pltf. admitted to Simon Jansen Romein and Stoffel Jansen, carpenter, that she received enough of linen for him for six shirts, whereof he had exhibited an affidavit, as the judgment judged 13 January last proves. Jan Eraat was ordered to call Simon Jansen Romein, who appearing was asked if Grietje Pieters admitted to him that she received for Jan Eraat a piece of linen for six shirts? Answers, that Grietje Pieters had said so and that she had given it to a woman, who had left for Ft. Orange. Symon Jansen having read to him the contents of his written declaration dated 13 January 1660 exhibited in Court by Jan Eraat, was asked, If he will confirm the same on oath? Answers, Yes; which was stated to Grietje Pieters, who was called in, who thereupon answered, then I will pay for it. And whereas Symon Jansen Romeyn on being sent for to Court to confirm his declaration by oath, excuses himself, that he cannot do it as he has people with him. The matter was postponed by the Court until the next Court day.

Page 316 Friday 10 June 1661 In the City Hall

Annetje Minnes, widow of Cornelis Nysen, late soldier of the Rt. Hon'ble Director General, going on her three and twentieth year, born in Amsterdam, and Neeltje Pieters, wife of Romeyn, the carman, also going on her three and twentieth year, born at Sardam, being sent for to Court appear. The Officer says, that they, under pretext of buying some linen, having stolen some goods from the house of Symon Jansen Romeyn, concluding that they shall be corrected and punished therefor. Neeltje Pieters denies having stolen the goods. The Officer undertakes, to prove it, requesting that Neeltje and Annetje shall go to prison until he shall take further information in the matter. Whereupon Annetje declares, that she said to Neeltje at the house of Symon Jansen Romeyn, Give me a pair of stockings; which Neeltje did, giving her three pairs. Neeltje says, that she thought, that was in trade. Symon Jansen Romeyn brought by the Court messenger, appears, is asked what theft was committed at his house, and was told to speak the precise truth: answering says, five to six pairs and some galloon and other cord is stolen which is by the above named Annetje and Neeltje, who bought at his house one or two ells fine linen and buttons and that he had received them back. The declaration of Symon Jansen Romeyn being read to Annetje and Neeltje, Annetje says, that Neeltje gave her the stockings and that Neeltje sold the stockings to Hillotje, the baker's. Neeltje says that Annetje sold her the stockings for a crown. Symon Jansen Romeyn again entering says, he got back five pairs of stockings, three pair of white and one pair of gray; and that he being a certain time at a house in Pearl Street, was asked

if he had buyers at his house without money, telling him of the stolen goods, and that they were carried hither and thither, and had received them back from Jurrien, the goldsmith, Cornelis Langevelt, Hilletje, the baker's, also a pair of slippers from Hendrick Asuerus and some black lace, yarn, silk and silk ribbon, missed but cannot say where it remained. Neeltje acknowledged to have sold the stockings; three pairs to Hilletje, the baker's, and one pair to Jan the carman's wife, and that Symon Janzen has had one pair hose, and says she bought the stockings from Annetje. Annetje denies it. Annetje says, that Neeltje stole a napkin and a salter. Neeltje says, that Annetje put the stockings in her bosom at Symon Jansen Romeyn's house; also brought some goods to her house. Neeltje acknowledges to have sold a piece of cord to Herry Breser; one bought from Annetje. Annetje denies it. Annetje and Neeltje were asked about the black lace and thread, and silk and ribbon. Answer, that did not take any. Annetje says, that Neeltje stole a napkin and salt cellar from Tryn Claas, which Neeltje denies. Annetje says, that Neeltje did it, drawing it afterwards out of her bag. Tryn Claas appearing in Court was asked, if a certain female had stolen anything from her? Answers, No; but that Cornelis Langevelt's wife lost a napkin. Neeltje asks Tryn Claas about the stockings to sell, and that she had put them in her bosom at Symon Jansen's. Annetje confesses, she gave Neeltje the stockings and says that Neeltje told her that she had not paid for the stockings; whereupon she said, Bless us, what have you done! and let it remain there, thinking as there followed no inquiry, that there would be no harm. Merritje, wife of Cornelis Langevelt, appearing in Court, is asked, if she had, at any time, lost a napkin and salt cellar?

Court Minutes of New Amsterdam - 1658-1661 - continued

Answers, Yes, but knows not who took them, and that they were brought back by Romeyn's wife, believing that they were taken from her. Neeltje confesses to have taken the napkins and says that Annetje afterwards brought the salt home to her, and that Annetje gave her a piece of lace which she had taken from Pieter Jacobson's Merritje. Neeltje acknowledges to have taken it from Symon Jansen Romeyn, and to have brought it him back. Merritje, the wife of Cornelis Langevelt is asked, whether she had had her napkin and salt cellar back? Answers, Yes; and that the same were brought to Tryn Claas. Annetje and Neeltje were asked, if they had taken anything else from Symon Jansen Romeyn. Answer, No. Burgomasters and Schepens order the Officer Pieter Tonneman to convey Annetje and Neeltje to prison, which was done.

Neeltje Pieters and Annetje Minnes, prisoners, appear in Court, against whom the Officer prosecutes his charge, concluding that Neeltje Pieters shall, for her committed theft, be brought to the place where justice is usually executed and there be bound fast to a stake, severely scourged and banished for ten years from the jurisdiction of this City, and that Annetje Minnes shall, whilst justice is administered to Neeltje Pieters, stand by and look at her, and after justice is executed shall be whipped severely within doors and banished for six years outside this City's jurisdiction, as she was with those from whom the goods were stolen by the above named Neeltje. Which demand being read to the prisoners, they fall on their Knees and beg forgiveness. Burgomasters grant the prisoners three times four and twenty hours, to bring in what they have for their excuse.

Court Minutes of New Amsterdam - 1658-1661 - continued

Page 327 Saturday 25 June 1661. In the City Hall

Annetje Minnes, prisoner, appearing in Court is asked if she has well considered, how much she received? Answers, Yes, and has not received any, declaring that Neeltje lent her a crown, and she gave her back a dollar thereon, sold no stockings to her, but that she gave Neeltje the stockings not thinking, that she did keep them without paying. Was asked if she had not brought Neeltje any into her stall and if she did not receive a crown for the stockings. Answers, No. Neeltje Pieters, a prisoner appearing in Court was asked, if she had both the stockings from Annetje? Answers, yes, and that they had divided together the money proceeding from the stockings, but does not know how much; then declares she received for the three pair of stockings last sold, seven and a half guilders, the half of which Annetje got; which being reported to Annetje, says it is not true, but that she borrowed a crown from her as before, and paid her Marys dollar, coming to the Wooden Horse and there earned it by work; and that Neeltje told her, she may keep it, and that she now says, she kept the crown for the pair of stockings. Neeltje being taken back to prison, Annetje Minnes is placed on the rack, and threatened with torture. Standing in the rack she is asked if she has not received any money for the stockings and helped to steal the stockings and had received none of the six guilders ten stivers for which the stockings were sold? Answers, No; and cannot say anything else with truth, than what she has said. Returning from the rack, she begs for pardon; as she had not discovered, that Neeltje had stolen the stockings was conveyed away back again.

Court Minutes of New Amsterdam - 1658-1661 - continued

JUDGMENT

The demand and conclusion of the Officer Pieter Tonneman on and against the prisoner, Nieltje Pieters, wife of Romeyn Servyn, carman, born at Serdam over and about certain crimes of theft committed by her at two different places, being considered by the W: Court of this City, Burgomasters and Schepens having affirmed the prisoner, Nieltje Pieters, and she having voluntarily confessed, without torture or bonds, that she stole from Symon Jansen Romeyn stockings, thread, pins and other cord; also from Merritje, wife of Cornelis Langevelt, some linen; of which, in a well ordered City, where justice is wont to be administered, cannot and ought not to be tolerated but as an example to others, be punished; Burgomasters and Schepens seeing, that the prisoner Neeltje Pieters is a pregnant woman, going on her last, having neither time nor hour, excuse her from the well merited punishment, sentence her to be banished for the time of eight consecutive years, condemning her in the costs and mises of justice. Thus done and adjudged by Burgomasters and Schepens, at the City Hall, Amsterdam, in New Amsterdam on Saturday, the 25th June 1661.

SENTENCE

Burgomasters and Schepens of this City having considered the demand and conclusion of the Officer Pieter Tonneman on and against the prisoner, Annetje Minnes, widow of Cornelis Nysen, late soldier in the service of the Hon. Privileged West India Company here, born at Amsterdam, for and on account of certain crime committed by her, Burgomasters and Schepens having examined the prisoner even unto threatening her with torture find, that the above named Annetje Minnes is an accomplice to the stealing

of the stockings, committed by Neeltje Pieters, because she gave the stockings to the above named Neeltje, but as she says not thinking, that Neeltje did keep them without paying; therefore has not committed such fault, as that on which the Officer draws his conclusion; moreover it is testified by credible witnesses, by whom she has much visited, that she has always borne herself honestly and well. Burgomasters and Schepens weighing the same excuse her from corporal punishment and banishment, dismissing herein the Officer's entered demand, condemning then, the aforesaid Annetje in the costs and mises of justice. Thus done and sentenced by Burgomasters and Schepens, at the City Hall, Amsterdam in N. Netherlands, on Saturday 25th June 1661.

Page 116 Description of New Netherland 1671

Translated from the Dutch door Arnoldus Montanus (A few excerpts
from this very interesting article.)

* * * Some plants sent hither from Holland thrive better than even in Holland; namely, the apple, pear, quince, cherry, plum, currant, apricot, buckthorn, medlar, peach and onion. Vines grow wild everywhere and bear in abundance blue and white muscatels and pork grapes (spek-druiven). * * * Every vegetable known to the Dutch is cultivated in the gardens. Water melons as savory as they are wholesome, are, when ripe, as large as a cabbage. * * * Gourds when cleaned out serve as water vessels. * * * Pumpkins grow luxuriant and agreeable. Corn sowed in hills six feet apart, sprouts up readily and prosperously. * * * Turkish beans, planted beside the corn, wind themselves around the stalk. Grey peas prosper here. Medicinal plants and indigo grow wild in abundance. The barley can be tied above the head. Furthermore, all sorts of flowers have a pleasant odor and appearance. The hills consist of fullers earth, or clay, fit for making dishes, pots and tobacco pipes. * * * In addition to other wild animals New Netherland furnishes, according to the ocular evidence of Adriaen van der Donk, full eighty thousand beavers a year. * * * Moreover they live in the water and on land together in troops, in houses built of timber over a running stream. * * * The woodpeckers excel the most in beautiful plumage and crests. These peck large holes in the trees, and thus make a noise as of wood cutters laboring in the forest. The pigeons fly in such flocks that the Indians designedly remove to their breeding places where the young birds, pushed by hundreds from their nests, serve for food during a long month for the whole family. New Netherland, hath, moreover, a wonderful little bird, scarcely an inch long, quite brilliant of plumage, and sucking flowers like the bee; it is so delicate that a dash of water instantly kills it, and when dried it is preserved as a curiosity. But this country particularly abounds in turkeys, whose number excites no less admiration than their rich flavour and their large size; for they go together in flocks of thirty and forty; they weigh some thirty and more pounds; they are shot or are caught with a bait concealing the hook. The waters here swarm, in the spring and fall, with swans, geese, wild ducks, teals, widgeons, divers, spoonbills and pelicans. The streams and lakes, rich with fishes, furnish sturgeon, salmon, carp, bass, pike, roach, bleak, all sorts of eel, smelt, sun fish, * * * and little codfish which are caught near the waterfalls.

I remit to Cornelia Low, wife of Andries Low, of New York, merchant, a debt of 20 Pounds.

Codicil confirms the above and leaves to Elizabeth, wife of Casparus Maybee, of New Rochelle, 40 Pounds, and to Anne, wife of Hendrick Van Pelt, 40 Pounds; to Christian, Sophia, and Catharine, daughters of Casparus Maybee, household goods, silver tankard, 2 silver porringers, 24 silver spoons, and silver mustard pot. Page 2 In the name of God, Amen. This 31 day of October, 1719, I, CLAAAS ROMEYN, of the outward of the City of New York, being in perfect health. I bequeath my soul into the hands of Almighty God who gave it me, trusting to be saved through the only merit of my Saviour and Redcemer, Jesus Christ. And as touching the disposal of my temporal estate as follows. I leave to my wife, Chrystintie Romeyn, for her natural life (she remaining my widow and not otherwise), all my estate, real and personal. After her death I give to my eldest son, John Romeyn, in preference to all other gifts, all that land and farm now in my possession, on New York island, which I bought of Captain Edward Blagge, and he is to pay for the same, for the use of all my heirs, the sum of 600 Pounds. If he refusesto do, my executors are to sell the same, and my son Samuel is to have the use of 100 Pounds for six years without interest. The 600 Pounds of the proceeds of the farm, are to be divided among my children and grand-children, namely, John, Albert, Daniel, and Samuel Romeyn, Gertrude, wife of Daniel Akerman. The four children of my daughter Leysbet, wife of John Sabrissie, deceased (for one share), Lydia, wife of Johanes Slingerland, and Saertie, wife of Hendrick Van Giesen. All the rest of my estate, after my wife's decease, is to go to all my children. I appoint my sons, John, Daniel, and Albert, executors.

ye Corner House of Barent Coursen and ffrom thence south ward

Mr. William S. Pelletreau from his manuscript notes on early deeds of
Manhattan Island, locates the houses mentioned in the respective ward
boundaries and states:

The House of Symon Jansen Romaine, was the West corner of Beaver
and Broad Street. South side of Beaver Street. (It was mentioned
in deed 1658.)

BRICK CHURCH MEMORIAL -- Theodore L. Wells 1877

The first Reformed Church of Monmouth County. Church records begin
in 1709.

Called in the records The Reformed Church of Freehold of the Navasink. Previous to 1683 the whole county of Monmouth is frequently called, in the Court Records, the County of Navasink. The whole region between the Ocean and the Raritan River was known as the Navasink. So called because occupied by a sub-tribe of the Lenape Indians, the Navasinks. Same region sometimes called the Raritans.

Page 24 In 1714 five years after the installation of Dominie Morgan the land on which this building stands, and the adjoining farm of Mr. Daniel P. Conover, became the property of the church. It was first bought of one Richard Salter or Sadler in 1709, for the sum of 450 Pounds by Thertie Romain, widow of Stoffell Romain, "for the use of the Dutch Presbyterian minister." In 1714 it was conveyed by Jacobus Romain her son, to John Schenck and Cornelius Cowenhoven of Middletown and Peter Tyson, of Freehold, in trust for the use of the congregation. Because of the uncertain tenure of lands and the conflict of titles at that early day the same property with the addition of 30 acres was deeded in 1748, to Cornelius Van Der Veer, of Middletown, and John Hans, of Freehold, "in trust for the Low Dutch congregation of Protestants."

Page 28 Dominie Morgan's ministry lasted 22 years. He received 100 persons into the communion of the church, the first of whom, Jan Romain, Benjamin Keener, Derrick Barkalow and Janake, his wife, were received the 13th of May 1711.

"A great many would ride to church on horseback. One horse generally carried a man and his wife, and very frequently the baby also. * * * Farm wagons without springs were thought to be comfortable. There were no means for heating the church. Stoves were not in existence. Private houses were made warm by the use of large fireplaces, but churches were built without chimneys. The ladies brought with them small foot-stoves, which kept their feet warm, while good homespun cloth in ample folds protected their persons."

O! the pleasant days of old, which so often people praise!

True, they wanted all the luxuries that grace our modern days!

Bare floors were strewn with rushes--the walls let in the cold;

O! how they must have shivered in those pleasant days of old.

Professor Kalm described an interesting marriage custom and its practise in New Jersey in the middle of the 18th century:

"There is a peculiar diverting custom here; in regard to marrying. When a man dies, and leaves his widow in great poverty, or so that she cannot pay all the debts with what little she has left, and that, notwithstanding all that, there is a person who will marry her, she must be married in no other habit than her own shift. By that means, she leaves to the creditors of her deceased husband her cloaths, and everything which they find in the house. But she is not obliged to pay them anything more, because she has left them all she owes other, even her cloathes, keeping only a shift to cover her, which the laws of the country cannot refuse her. As soon as she is married, and no longer belongs to the deceased husband, she puts on the cloaths which the second has given her. The Swedish clergyman here have often been obliged to marry a woman in a dress which is so little expensive, and so light. This appears from the registers kept in the churches."

When a Jerseywoman took up her residence in a neighboring Province, she seems to have taken this peculiar custom with her, if we are to believe a veracious newspaper of that day:

"Annapolis in Maryland June 4. About a Fortnight ago there happened in Frederick County in this Province, as commercial a wedding as we remember to have heard of: A couple with their Guests, (having obtained a License) came to the house of a Reverend Clergyman, late in the Evening, after he had been in Bed some time with his Wife, and desired to be married; he willing to oblige them, got up and dressed himself in order to perform the Ceremony; but the Bridegroom having imbib'd a Notion, that if he married the woman with anything, he should be obliged to pay all her Debts, and not otherwise, and as she came from the Province of New Jersey he was doubtful about her Circumstances; the obliging Bride, to renounce all incumbrances, stripped to her Buff, and two women held a sheet between her and the Clergyman while he performed his office; but she having forgot her Cap at undressing, in the midst of the Ceremony it came into her mind, and she pulled that off too, and flung it on the Bed, and was married to her Spouse (if not in a Wedding Suit) in her Birth Day Suit: After the Ceremony was over the Bridegroom put on her one of his own Shirts to cover her--This Account the Reader may perhaps look on as improbably and untrue, but he may be assured it is a certain and naked Truth." Pennsylvania Journal June 18, 1752. No. 500.

(Note at bottom of this page) Dirck Romeyn is said to have been descended from Claes or Klaese (Nicholas) Jansen Romeyn, who, according to family tradition, migrated from Amsterdam to Brazil, between 1650 and 1670, and came thence to New Netherland about 1653. It is more probable that it was his father, Jan Romeyn, who was the emigrant, and that Claes was but an infant, if he was here as early as 1653, for it was not until May 2, 1679, that he mar. Styntje Albertse Terhune. He bought a plantation, March 3, 1679, at Gravesend, L.I., where he resided several years. In 1696 he bought a tract of 300 acres of land between the Hackensack and Saddle rivers, to which he added 600 acres in 1679. He was a cooper by trade. He lived near Hackensack about ten years, removing thence to Shappekenike, or Greenwich, now in New York city, where he died. Kristyne Ter Heune, wid. of Klaes Jansen Romeyn, Minades Islade (i.e., from Manhattan Island), was received into the Hackensack church by letter, May 18, 1732.--History of Paterson, by William Nelson, I., 210. In the work just quoted details are given of the children and grandchildren of Claes Jansen Romeyn, which indicate this line of descent for Dirck: Jan, son Claes Jansen, m. Lammetie Bougaert, May 20, 1699, and was the father of Klaes, bap. Feb. 25, 1700, m. 1st Elizabeth Outwater May 20, 1726; she d. Sept.--1732, leaving one son, Thomas, b. March 9, 1729; he graduated at Princeton College in 1762, and became a noted preacher in the Reformed Dutch Church. Nicholas Romeyn in April, 1733, "trod again in the honorable state of matrimony with Rachel Vreelandt" according to his Dutch

family Bible (the Hackensack Dutch church records, in chronicling the baptisms of their children, in at least one instance, 1744, gives her name as Marretje.) They had Dirck, baptized at Hackensack August 1, 1736, who d. in inf. On Jan. 12, 1744, was b. another son, who was bap. at Hackensack Jan. 29, 1744, Dirk. This was used by the Dutch in Northern New Jersey generally as the equivalent of Richard, but sometimes for Theodorick. The latter interpretation was assumed by the boy born in 1744. Upon graduating at Princeton in 1765 he received besides his small parchment diploma, a certificate of his religious conduct and standing, signed by President Finley, at Princeton Sept. 28, 1765. After leaving College he studied theology, part of the time under the Rev. J.M. Goetschius of Hackensack and Schraalenburg, who preached his ordination sermon, in May, 1766, when he was called to the pastorate of the Dutch churches of Hackensack and Schraalenburgh in May, 1776, just at the beginning of the Revolution. When the British pursued Washington through Hackensack in November, 1776, they plundered Dominie Romeyn's house and destroyed all his furniture, books and papers. He then removed his family to New Paltz, and thence to his mother-in-law's at Marbletown, where they remained nearly two years. He made frequent but brief visits to his congregation, often at great personal risk, he being obnoxious to the British and their tory sympathizers. He received many calls to other and better charges, but it was not until 1784 that he concluded to change, and accepted a call to Schenectady. Here he was largely instrumental in establishing an academy, which was subsequently developed into Union College. He received the degree of D.D. in 1789, from Queen's College, and in 1797 was appointed a Professor of Theology by the General Synod. He d. April 16, 1804. He m. June 11, 1767, Elizabeth, dau. of Wessels and Catherine

(Dubois) Brodhead; she d. July 27, 1815. One of their children was the Rev. John Brodhead Romeyn.

Page 684 Saturday, Feb. 3 --- Death of a Patriot. Died yesterday Benjamin Romaine, aged eighty-two years. This octogenarian was formerly a Democrat of the right stamp, a friend of the people and a patriot of the first water. He got an act of the legislature appropriating a goodly sum to disinter the bones of the martyrs for liberty who died on board the prison ships at the Wallabout, and to erect a mausoleum over them near the scene of their sufferings in the flesh. He made a grand funeral procession through the streets of New York, with coffins and hearses and banners inscribed with 11,500 martyrs, with scarfs of hum-hum, most appropriately named, and cotton gloves, white as the bones, and other habiliments of woe; and then buried the bones in his cellar, or some other ignoble spot, and put the money in his pocket, from whence it never again emerged.

HOLLAND SOCIETY 1916 YEAR BOOK

From Garret Abeel's Historical Notes About the City of New York From 1609 to 1792.

Page 5 In 1660 "between Aug. and Oct. of that year, the village of Bergen was founded. The lines of the village are still marked by the streets of Jersey City, which surround and pass thru it. An open square was reserved in the center. The village was protected by a rectangular palisade, with a gate at the center of each side. Later a well was dug in the middle of the open square and a corner lot was reserved for a school. With the village came also the church and the school: in fact, a condition made by each pioneer in accepting a grant of village lot or outlying farm was, that ministers of the Reformed faith should be provided and education of the children secured. * * *

The first stone church was octagonal (Ed. Note: Built in 1680; octagonal, size - about 20 feet in diameter.) It stood south of the village just outside the palisade. * * *

A new church was built (Ed. note: size 45 x 60) on the old Dutch models in 1773, and in 1841 it was found that this edifice was too small to accommodate the growing congregation. As the building stood in the cemetery, surrounded by graves, it could not be enlarged without disturbing the remains of the departed. The old building was torn down and its successor erected on a portion of the old "Glebe." The old stones from the first 2 churches were used in the new walls. It was dedicated in 1842 and still remains as the house of worship of the modern congregation.

MARKETS The city has a market every day in the week, and plentier no city on the continent can boast. In the first place all the year around the very best of beef may be purchased in the greatest plenty. The average price for the very best is from 4 to 4½ Pence by the quarter.*** Pork is exceedingly plentiful in the fall: sells from 4 to 4½ Pence per pound. Wild fowl of every kind when in season is brought in quantities daily to the market. Long Island shores near the sea are covered with those (fowls) at some seasons of the year. The best wild goose is from 2 shillings to 3 or 3 and 6 Pence. A brace of ducks, if fat, one shilling 6 Pence. Snipes and other birds in plenty; grouse, heath-hens, quails and wild pigeons, partridges; amazing plenty. Incredible are the quantities of tame fowl of every kind daily brought to market, dead.

* * * * Of fruit of various kinds natural to the climate our markets abound. Besides, we are thru our extensive navigation supplied with the products of different climes, such as oranges, lemons, limes, pineapples, raisins, currants, etc.

Of pulse, herbs and roots of the different kinds, the markets abound throughout the year. * * *

In short, it is impossible to describe the plenty that has rained through out the year. The rich have never wanted for luxuries and the poor have been able to subsist upon the earnings of a few hours labor. * * * Hence there are few beggars, but a few lazy, drunken wretches not even fit objects for the almshouse.

The Holland Society was formed April 30, 1885, and at the time of the First Dinner, held Jan. 8, 1886, Rev. Dr. Henry J. Van Dyke, Jr., responded to the fifth regular toast with complimentary remarks on "The Dutch Virtues." In stressing the virtue of liberality he stated

When you see a man ready to persecute in flesh or spirit those who do not believe as he does, you may be sure that his own creed has soured on his stomach. Our ancestors were not much afflicted in that way. And so it came to pass that when all the nations of Europe were divided into hostile camps, Holland was the one sanctuary of a free conscience. And when the New Englanders were smoking and hanging witches the Dutchman smoked his pipe in peace and hung his hams in the chimney. And when the constitutions of the 13 original States were framed, the only one in which absolute religious liberty and equality were clearly, distinctly, and forever proclaimed and established was the State of New York. * * * * *

The Puritan, says one who ought to know, is dead. God rest his soul. He never found peace in this world. May he fare better in the next. The Cavalier is vanishing since doubtlets and ribands went out of fashion. His legs are growing so thin and his head so small that he cannot long endure. But the Dutchman, the broad, solid Dutchman survives,--survives in the spring of our Constitution,--survives in the liberality which is binding all denominations of Christians into unity, and combining them in those works of practical charity in which Holland and the U.S. of America stand foremost among modern nations,--survives in a free church, a free press, free thought, and free schools,--the Dutchman survives. And though I do not need to seek any strange oath to affirm it, it is my solid conviction that this is a case of the survival of the fittest.

The Second Year Book of the Holland Society gives an interesting comment regarding the way of life.

Page 49 The farmers raised their own flax, and from it made their linen, homespun garments, and ropes. A cobbler went with his kit from house to house, remaining at one for days, at another for weeks, until the entire foot-gear of the family was placed in thorough repair for another year's use. The larders were well supplied. Each householder fattened his own pigs and beeves, and poultry of all kinds was plentiful; and besides the smaller game which abounded in the vicinity, an abundant supply of venison was brought from beyond the Catskills, and sold in open market on the streets. There were 4 meals,--an early breakfast, dinner at noon, tea at 4 o'clock in the afternoon, and a hot supper at 8 in the evening; and this brought about the reunion of the whole family, with invited friends. A large number of colored people were maintained by every householder whose means justified it, and these generally took the family name and made kind and attached servants.

J. Woodhull Beekman's speech recorded in the 3d volume gives us a reason for the dispersion from New Amsterdam.

Page 77 After that rascible old gentleman, Peter Stuyvesant, * * * surrendered Fort Nassau, Fort Orange, and New Amsterdam to the English invader, a great many Hollanders, not willing perhaps to live in close proximity with their conquerors, fled the country, and came to

New Jersey, where a considerable portion settled at Communipaw, where they soon made the desert blossom as a rose. * * * These Hollanders also settled along the rivers, for, like the muskrats, they stuck to the valleys, Raritan and Passaic, in the counties of Somerset, Bergen, Passaic, parts of Middlesex, Monmouth, and Hunterdon, a considerable number coming from Albany and settling in New Brunswick.

1903 YEAR BOOK HOLLAND SOCIETY Address of Rev. Dr. Burrell

The Dutch have always been willing to blend their blood with the arterial current of our American civilization. They have never from the beginning flocked by themselves as those other fellows have. We did have a sort of pre-emption right in Manhattan Island for a while, and people now and then are found to inquire what has become of the pre-emption right the Dutch had in this island. We never had possession of this island but for 40-odd years,--from 1624 until the time we passed out. There were only 300 houses on Manhattan Island and less than 3,000 people here at the time of the Dutch possession, and that is the only time the Dutch ever flocked together in American history. * * * * * The gentlemen who are in Wall Street today are a good deal safer because the Half Moon once landed on Manhattan Island and brought with it the thrift, the industry, and the honesty of old Holland, than they would be without it. I feel absolutely sure that though your New England Longfellow wrote it, his Village Blacksmith must have been a Dutchman:

His brow is wet with honest sweat,
He earns whate'er he can;
He looks the whole world in the face,
For he owes not any man.

REVOLUTIONARY WAR PENSION RECORDS

Benjamin Romine - New Jersey - S 4135

On 11th August, 1834, personally appeared before Henry B. Hagerman, one of the Judges of the Inferior Court of Common pleas Benjamin Romine, a resident of the township of Franklin, County of Bergen, state of New Jersey, aged 88 years, who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 7, 1832:

That he entered the service of the U.S. under the following officers and served as herein stated,

In the summer of 1776 he volunteered under Capt. Van Houten, mustered at a place called the Ponds, Bergen Co., from which place they were marched to Hoboken nearly opposite the City of New York, from there we crossed to the said City Here we were stationed for some time watching the movement of the British flotilla then occupying part of the North River and it was expected they would attempt the capture of the city of New York but landed their men on Staten Island We then recrossed the North River to Pawle's hook Here we were stationed guarding the shore and landing places after having served one month he was discharged and went home Col. Tunis Day commanded the Regiment to which he belonged.

In the fall of the same year (1776) he volunteered for one month under Capt. Ed. Merselius stationed at Fort Lee and the English neighborhood our duty on this occasion was to assist in the building of Fort Lee and to perform guard duty the British had at the time possession of the City of New York Served the full month and was Discharged

Later in the fall of 1777 he was drafted for one month under Capt. Peter Fell stationed at Paramus and Hopperstown, their duty on that occasion was to prevent the Refugees and Toris from plundering and distressing the inhabitants who were constantly committing depredations Served the full month and was discharged and went home.

In the Latter part of the Spring on the Beginning of the summer to the best of the deponent's recollection 1778 he was drafted for one month under Capt. Abraham Harring stationed at the Liberty pole and Closter, marching from place to place as necessity required and along the North River guarding the Shores and landing plans also defending the inhabitants the British had possession of the City of New York and the North River the Refugees and Tories of Fort Lee and the Lower part of the County whose men were constantly committing depredations Served the time and was dismissed.

In the Spring of 1779 he was ordered out under Capt. John Willis for one month, but believes he served six weeks. Stationed a part of the time at Aquackonnet on the Essex side of the Passaic River and the Resider of the time on the Bergen Co. side of the same river performing guard duty and protecting the inhabitants from depredation and plundering parties of the Enemy which were very frequent and there was a severe skirmish near the bridge in which considerable blood was shed on both sides. Gen. Winds commanded the Militia which was assembled here in a

larger body from the neighboring counties. He believes it was about the time that Genl Waine stormed the fort at Stony point after having served the full period of six weeks to the best of his recollection the above service was in case of emergency when he was honorably discharged. In the year 1780 he was drafted for one month under Capt. Peter Ward stationed at Hoopertown and Paramus (cannot state the month, believes it was in the summer season knows it was in the year when Hoppertown burned by the British and when Major Andrews was executed at - - - performing guard duty and also to prevent the - - - carried on with the British in the City of New York and the lower part of the County Served the time and was discharged.

In the Spring of 1781 he was drafted for one month under Capt. John Willis stationed at the bridge and Paramus performing guard duty the British had possession of the City of New York the Refugees and Tories of Fort Lee who were constantly committing depredations on the inhabitants Served the time and was discharged.

In the summer to the Best of the deponents recollection 1782 he was ordered out for one month under Capt. John Mead stationed at Paramus from which place they were marched to Hackensack at Bridge and the Liberty Pole the British refugees and Tories still occupying their former station as mentioned heretofore their duty on this occasion was to guard protect and defend the county from the invasion of the enemy Served the time and was honorably discharged All the services which the deponent performed during the war of the Revolution were in the County of Bergen and state of New Jersey except where otherwise stated in his declaration Col. Tunis Dey commanded the Regiment to which the deponent belonged and when and where necessity required his presence

In the foregoing recital of his Revolutionary services this deponent has stated none but such as he conscientiously knows he actually performed (he verily believes there were more monthly tours of duty he performed but cannot at this late day recollect when and where they were It is probable that in some of his monthly tours of duty he may have mistaken the seasons or the years. He has however narrated the events of his services with a conscientious regard to truth and is fully satisfied that he has faithfully served his country in the field for each term alleged for which he claims a pension under the law of June 7, 1832 and was not employed in an evil pursuit during the time above mentioned.

To the interrogatories he answers and saith that he was born in the year 1746 the record of his age is recorded in a book kept for that purpose belonging to the Consistory of the Low Dutch Church in Hackensack, that he was living in the now township of Franklin in the County of Bergen and State of New Jersey when first called into service and where he has resided ever since and still doth reside.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatsoever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any of the United States.

Thomas Hammond made his mark on an affidavit stating they have been neighbors since their youth and served together on occasion in the Revolutionary War.

Bradford, Examining Clerk.

John Romine draws \$20 Samuel Davis states that he has known Romine ever since he was a boy, that Romine and himself served a three months tour together during the War of the Revolution. They marched from Loudoun County in July previous to the surrender of Cornwallis to Fredericksburg and then Williamsburg. Is certain that Romine never done any other service than the 3 months tour above related. Romine was drafted for a 6 months tour, but Col. Peyton let him off after serving the 3 months as before stated--at the instance of Capt. David, father of said Samuel.

On the 9th July the foregoing statement of Samuel Davis was read to Romine, who acknowledged that it was true in all particulars--that a 3 months tour was all the service he had done during the War of the Revolution and that it is all that he gave with Col. Joseph Johnson and Jacob Copeland, who wrote his declaration--he gave them \$20 --

A letter from Mrs. Ruby H. Windrow, North Adams, Mass. inquires re veteran. She has confused him with a John Romine who served in 3d Regt N.Y. and whose wife Rebecca moved to Muskingum Co. Ohio about 1825 and lived there until her death. She thot he died 1797-8.

Reply to Mrs. Windrow from Pension Bureau gives the following information:

There is no claim for pension on file based upon service in the Revolution of a John Romine who served in the New York troops, nor of a John Romine who died about 1797-8.

The Revolutionary War records of this office show that one John Romine applied for pension under the Act of June 7, 1832 at which time he was a resident of Harrison County, Virginia. When he made this application for pension, he stated that he had resided in Loudoun Co., Virginia, and that he served in Capt. Thomas Carmon's company, Col. Merriweather's Virginia regiment, and that his enlistment was for six months. He was then aged 73 years.

Revolutionary War Pensions - Continued

On the basis of his having served six months in the Revolutionary War, John Romine was allowed pension on a certificate issued May 2, 1833, for \$20 a year; the pension commenced March 4, 1831.

The application papers which were submitted by John Romine were withdrawn from the files for use by the United States District Attorney in a reexamination of his case and are not on file in this office at this time. The reexamination shows that John Romine had rendered service of only three months in the Revolutionary War, not having served the full time of his enlistment of six months, which period was necessary to entitle him to a pension, hence, his name was dropped from the pension roll because of insufficient service.

On this 31st day of October, 1832 personally appeared in open Court, before the Judges of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas in and for the County of Bergen now sitting, Samuel Romine a resident of Franklin township in the county of Bergen and State of New Jersey, aged seventy four years, who being first duly sworn * * * That he was born at Hackensack in the County of Bergen and State of New Jersey on the twenty first day of July, 1750, that he resided at a place now called Franklin in the county of Bergen, at which place he first entered the service of the United States, thinks it was in the spring of 1776 when he volunteered and performed one months service under Capt. Joseph Beam, stationed at Amboy, Major John Zabriskie commanding--that he performed one month's service under Capt. Crynes Van Houten, stationed in the city of New York, Col. Tunis Dey commanding the regiment to which he belonged--that he performed one months service under Capt. Joseph Beam stationed at Nornimus near Paulus Hook, Col. Tunis Dey commanding the regiment at the same time the British being in possession of the city of New York during the time of his last mentioned service--that he performed one months service under Capt. Van Houten stationed at Elizabethtown, New Jersey--the only Field officer which he can now recollect by name is Adjutant Barodus or Barandus--that he performed one months service under Capt. Willis stationed at Aquahannonk, Gen. Dynes commanding--that he performed one tour of service under Capt. Van Houten stationed at Mill Stem, at which time he thinks he was about six weeks in service, Col. Tunis Dey & Major Beard commanded the regiment to which he belonged, cannot particularize the year, but knows it was in the winter season and that the British were laying in New Brunswick at the same time--that he performed too several monthly tours of service under Capt. John Willis stationed at the English Neighborhood and at Closter, Major Goetchius commanded on both occasions--he also performed one months service under Capt. Willis, stationed at Baskingridge near Morris Town, but cannot

recollect the name of the officer commanding in that station--that he performed one month's service under Capt. Van Houten stationed at Paramus, a Major commanded but he cannot recollect the name, but thinks it was Major Richard Dey--that he performed one months service under Capt. Elias Romine stationed at Closter, at which time they had no Field officer commanding--that he performed one months service under Capt. John Outwater stationed at Hackensack as a Guard--that he performed one months service under Capt. Samuel Demarest stationed at New Bridge on the Hackensack River--that he was in the service of the United States from time to time from the commencement of the Revolutionary War to the end thereof, but cannot particularize--neither the times, places, or officers under whom he served otherwise than as herein before stated--has no recollection of ever having received any written or private discharge--has no documentary evidence and knows of no other persons whom he can procure to testify to his services excepting Thomas Hammond, William Van Voorhees and John Packer, each of whom were fellow soldiers during a greater portion of the time of service above mentioned--that he has resided in the township now called Franklin where he now resides, ever since the Revolutionary War excepting about five years, during which he resided about two years in Sussex County and three years in the Genessee Country--the principal Fish officers of the Continental Army whom he recollects to have seen during his said service are General Washington and several others whom he cannot now name, who were with the Army stationed near Ramahough.

State of New Jersey - Bergen County On this 23d day of July 1833 personally appeared before the subscriber, a Justice of the Peace in and for the said County of Bergen and State of New Jersey, Samuel Romine of Franklin in said County aged 75 years and personally well known in said County and to the subscriber as a man of truth and good standing and being duly sworn saith that he is the same Samuel Romine who on the 31st day of October 1832 made a declaration under oath of his Revolutionary service in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress of June 7th 1832, which was done in open Court then sitting in and for the County aforesaid when his original declaration was made out the purpose of business before the Court was such as to prevent him from detailing minutely each tour of duty he performed and specifying as accurately as he has since learned is necessary--the officer who commanded on each occasion and time and Nature of the duty--he has endeavored to refresh his memory by bestowing more thought and reflection on the subject and desires that the Secretary of War and Commissioner of Pensions will receive this as his amended declaration in which he will endeavor to set forth more specifically and in as much detail as his memory will allow, the Revolutionary Service he performed.

He entered the Militia of the State of New Jersey at the Ponds in County of Bergen as a Volunteer and served one month under Capt. Joseph Beam, believes it was in the year 1775 in months of April and May, was marched from the Ponds to Hackensack through Newark, Elizabeth Town and to their station at Amboy, believes County of Middlesex Was employed on this station in Building a Fort does not know the commanding officers, but recollects that a Frenchman superintended the construction of the Fort. From thence was marched back to Hackensack--served the time and was discharged. He served one month as a volunteer in the year 1776 in months of July and August under Capt. Crinus Vanhouten--was stationed at the Ponds, Franklin township, Bergen County--marched to Hackensack from thence to New York City doing guard duty. Marched back to Hackensack and was discharged--Col. Tunis Dey commanding Regt.

He then volunteered and served one month in the year 1775 in months of October and November under Capt. Joseph Beam, stationed at Horseamus, Powles, Hack and Bergen Point, doing guard duty watching the enemy who were then in the City of New York and making constant excursions in the county of Bergen, committing depredations on the Inhabitants. Col. Dey commanding Regt.--served the time and was discharged.

He served Six weeks as a volunteer in the year 1777 in months of January and February under Capt. C. Van Houten at the Ponds, Bergen County, was marched to Morristown and thence to Milestone, believes in County of Middlesex where they were stationed, watching the enemy who was in possession of New Brunswick the same time. Marched back to place of

enrollment and was discharged--Major Beard of Battallion and Col. Dey commanding Reg't.

He then served one month as a volunteer in the year 1777--does not recollect the month but believes it was in the spring under Capt. C. Van Houten, was marched from Hackensack, Bergen County, through Newark to Elizabeth town, County of Essex where he continued the time. The British were then on Staten Island, who frequently fired on them with their Cannon, he being stationed at Elizabeth town. He served one month in the year 1779 in Months of August and Sept. being drafted under Capt. John Willis stationed at Acquaconac Bergen County doing guard duty and other services---Col. Tunis Dey Commanding Reg't and Gen. Wines the Brigade. Served the time and was discharged.

He served one month as a Volunteer in the year 1780 in months of June and July under Capt. John Willis, entered at the Ponds, Bergen Co. and was marched to Basken Ridge Morris County and then to Elizabeth town, Essex County doing duty as guard--does not recollect the Major nor Col. as they were strangers to him--was marched back to Ponds, having served the time was discharged.

He served one month being drafted in the year 1780 in the months of July and August as he believes under Capt. Elias Romine Col. Tunis Dey Commanding Reg't was stationed at the Liberty Pole, Bergen County, when they had an engagement with the British and Refugees doing guard duty. Served the time and was discharged.

He served one month in the year 1782 in the month of August and Sept. being drafted under Capt. John Outwater. Col. Tunis Dey Commanding Reg't was stationed at Hackensack, Bergen County, Liberty Pole and English Neighborhood doing guard duty and other services. - Served the time and was disch. The last tour was by serving one month in the year 1782 in months of Nov. & Dec. under Capt. Sam. Demarest--Col. Dey Commanding. Was stationed at Hackensack and other places doing duty as in preceding months and in Co. of Bergen.

As the Second Interrogatory was not answered in his original declaration but was questioned in the Court and answered by him that the record of his age is recorded in the Consistory of the Dutch Reformed Church at Hackensack in County and State aforesaid.

From the great length of time which has elapsed since the before stated services were rendered many particulars must have escaped his memory He has related all which he can remember as connected with his services and which are calculated to explain them. In the order of time and in the name perhaps of some of his superior officers, he may in some instances perhaps have fallen into mistakes. He asks a reasonable allowance for the frailty of human memory whilst he has faithfully endeavoured to adhere conscientiously to the truth, in all events and occurrences of which he has spoken--and he verily believes that he faithfully served his country in the War of the Revolution in different monthly tours for the full period of 13 months as a private for which term of months he claims a pension from the United States under the Law of Con. of June 7th, 1832.

THE DOWLING FAMILY OF THE SOUTH

Page 38 Within months after the Battle of Dunker Hill John Dowling enlisted in Pinckney's 1st S.C. Reg. on 11-4-1775. 4½ years later his name disappeared from its rolls. It was not until 1782 that his military service was again recorded. Then he is known to have been a guerrilla with the dreaded "Swamp-fox", Francis Marion. John and Nancy Boutwell were married 1783. They lived near Jeffries Creek--probably Dale County, S.E. Alabama. Their 1st child, Rev. Dempsey Dowling, married Martha Stokes, and the 5th child of the latter was Noel Dowling. Noel married Sarah D. McDonald. The 6th child of Noel and Sarah was Daniel Young Dowling, born 3 July 1842. He married Rebecca Jane Dick 11-14-1865, and their 7th child was Marcus Dowling. Marcus married Marguerite Patzman, and their 2nd child, Irene Gertrude Dowling, married B.B. Romine.

In 1907-1908 Daniel Young Dowling was living in Dale County, Ala. He certified to the tax assessor of that county that he enlisted as a private, 14 Feb. 1862, at Haw Ridge, Ala. in Co. I, 33d Ala. Inf. Reg.; was captured at Marietta, Ga. and taken to Camp Morton, Indiana; was paroled at Richmond, Va. 20 March 1865. Stated he was born 3 July 1842 in Dale County, Ala.

The Van Benschoten Family in America W.H. Van Benschoten

Sarah (Zara) married Isaac Romaine at Hackensack, N.J., b. 4-1-1716, son of Jan Claes Romeyn and Lambertje Bogert and grandson of Claes Kuyper Janse Romeyn, who came over from Holland in 1653. The record of their marriage is not to be found; it doubtless took place at Poughkeepsie and fell within the great gap of church records there. Isaac was a widower, and his 1st wife, Osseltje Westervelt, had borne him two children at Hackensack, N.J. before they removed to Dutchess Co., one, a Jan, b. 2-10-1740, the other, Casparis, b. 11-12-1741. Osseltje must have died not long after the migration which doubtless took place in 1742, or soon thereafter. He was a farmer, "masoner" and Lieut. of the militia. On 2-1-1747 he was installed deacon at Fishkill church and on 1-12-1752 he was elected elder there. Zara, it appears, was also a member of that church. On 6-10-1759, "Lieut. Isaac Romine of Poughkeepsie precinct" conveys away land and in 1769 Isaac is found acting as one of the executors of his brother David's estate. In 6-1778 he lived "about 2 miles northeast of Poughkeepsie." When he and Zara died and where they are buried are unknown.

Samuel Romine and his wife, Nancy (Dearman) Romine, natives of Harrison Co., where they had been married, left there and came to upper Left Fork of Reedy in the year 1854. To them were born and by them reared five sons and two daughters. * * * Their names given for this writing by the grandson, Earl Romine, are as follows:

Benjamin Romine married Miss Etalina Riley, of Lower Flat Fork, Oct. 9, 1865. Reared a family whose names we do not know with certainty.

John Middleton Romine married Miss Sarah Riley, of Flat Fork, 9-15-1866. They made their home on Flat Fork and there reared a family.

James K. Polk Romine married Miss Julia Runnion. They made their home on upper Left Reedy. Names of their children we do not have.

Samuel Romine was first married to Marinda Bridges, daughter of William and Susan Bridges, and their children were: William W., born 9-26-1834; Rachel C., b. 4-17-1836; Malelecl O., 1-25-1838; Theresa S., 2-11-1840; Ethelinda M., 2-23-1842; Juliet E., 3-1-1844; Susan E., 9-22-1846; Adelbert S., 10-18-1848; David I., 4-28-1854; all living. Mr. Romine was again wedded in Wood County 6-26-1862, to Caroline Dewey, born in Westfield, Medina Co., Ohio 1-26-1837. They have one son, Samuel F., b. 1-13-1868, who lives at home. Thomas Jefferson Dewey, father of Mrs. Romine, is now living in Kansas; her mother, Jerusha E. (Burr) Dewey, is deceased. The Romines are a Union family, who love all their country. One son of Samuel, Malelecl O., served in the Union Volunteer forces in the War of 1861, a member of the 14th W. Va. Regiment, enlisting 8-25-1862, and receiving honorable discharge 6-27-1865, at Cumberland, Md. Samuel Romine, an uncle for whom the subject of this sketch was named, was a warrior in the 1812 War. Matthew Maddox, maternal grandfather of Mr. Romine, was a soldier in the Revolutionary War and was wounded in the service. Samuel Romine has held the office

of district treasurer. He learned the cooper trade when young, but follows the occupation of farming, having cleared and put under cultivation the farm he now owns in Lubeck District.

Mrs. Nancy Beckwith, Washington, W. Va., furnished a bulletin of the Bethel Baptist Church, R. 4, Parkersburg, W. Va. with the following information:

1847-May 9: Samuel Romine, Samuel Smitherman, John Harwood and seven others met to organize the Bethel Baptist Church, the three named being trustees. Samuel Romine gave the piece of land on which the "Meeting House" was erected.

1853--January 8: Deed for lot of land on which the church house stood was recorded. Bethel Baptist Church, in Romine Settlement, when organized, was part of what was then "Quakertown Community," Virginia.

1874--April 11: Samuel Romine gave to the church a piece of ground adjoining the present lot. Measurements containing 128 perches. Over years that followed he gave ground of which deeds were recorded as given.

The Grand Prairie Harmonical Institute was organized in 1851 and a silent member was said to have been Horace Greely. One deed to the 350 acre farm showed him to be a trustee. It was located in Prairie township, Warren County, Indiana. More generally known as "The Community Farm," it was the intention of the founders to teach handicrafts, especially blacksmithing, carpentry, and allied trades. Cyrus Romine was connected with this movement.

F. W. Romine, Farmer, Praireton, was born in Vigo Co., Ind. March 21, 1838 and has lived in the county ever since. He was married August 15, 1869 to Miss Mary A. Steadman, a daughter of Jefferson Steadman, of Morgan County, Ohio. She came to Terre Haute, Indiana and was brought up by Dr. Bell, of Terre Haute. They have only moved 3 times since they went to keeping house and are now living on a small farm of forty acres in the northwest corner of Section 2. They have four children, three boys and one girl: James Bell, Emily Alice, William David, and Thomas D. They have also adopted a son of Benjamin Romine, who lost his wife a short time ago. He has been a member of the United Brethren Church for seventeen years. * * * His brother, Samuel Romine, was a volunteer in the 85th Regiment, Ind. Vol. Inf.; was in thirty two battles of the war, and had his hat rim cut off and the letters U.S. shot off his belt and his canteen shot from him; he was also severely injured by being run over by an ambulance, which has proved to be a permanent disability, and for which he receives from the Government a pension. F.W. Romine has met with some severe losses, but has come through safely and is now in comfortable circumstances.

In the year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety-Eight the 30 day of March Before me Don Zenon Trudeau, Lieut. Governor and Civil & Military Commander of Upper Louisiana appeared Christian Romaine an inhabitant of Merameck who acknowledges and confesses to be legitimately indebted to Messrs Clamorgan-Loisel et Co in the sum of two hundred thirty eight dollars and four reals which sum he binds himself to pay to said Clamorgan in the course of the month of October of this present year in good and merchantable peltries and as security for which sum the said Christian Romaine binds encumbers and mortgages a farm situated on the River Merameck, bounded on the South by the salt pit of Jacques Clamorgan, fronting on said River Merameck, and bounded on two other sides by lands of the Royal Domain, with all the houses, buildings, dependencies, also three cows and their product marked in the ear with the customary mark, a yoke of young oxen not broken in--the said property free of all debts, charges and mortgages. The said Romaine reserved all power and right to sell the said property until full payment of the aforesaid sum (is made) and anything done contrary thereto will be regarded as null and of no effect; the said farm and animals however, may be sold in default of payment even though it should have passed into the hands of one or many purchasers, the said property being considered as belonging to the said Clamorgan Loisel et Co. and in their default, to their heirs and legal representatives

James Romine, Jr., was born in Kansas on 1-20-1876. He was one of the pioneers of Custer Co., Nebr. James, Jr., distinctly remembers the trip overland of the family from the old home in Kansas to the new one in Custer Co., and the hardships which somehow cannot be avoided in a new country. He also recalls a period of depression when corn was offered for 15¢ a bushel, and eggs at 5¢ a doz., so that, although prices today have raised the cost of living beyond any previous period in the history of the world, few in this country have to endure privations the majority of the pioneers experienced in bringing about the civilization of the different portions of the United States. In 1896 Mr. Romine married Lillian Copass, and they have one daughter, Florence, who is now one of the most popular school teachers. * * *

That I am 31 years of age and live in Bradley Co. I claim my Indian descent thru my father--I don't know which of my grandparents. I believe my father was born and raised in Sevier Co., Tenn. Don't know if he ever lived with any Indians. I am recognized as a white person, so was my father. Don't know anything about my grandparents and don't know anybody who does. I don't know the names of any of my father's brothers and sisters. I don't know whether my grandparents came from H.C. or Sevier Co., Tenn. If they ever lived in H.C. I don't know the part. My husband is a white man.

A note typed on this statement: Applicant to all appearances is a white woman. She doesn't seem to know anything about her Indian ancestry.

Mrs. Ruby Bishop Smith, Montgomery, Alabama, has prepared this account of descendants of a son of Layton Romine (see index).

My great, great, grandfather, James Romine, son of Layton Romine, was born in Tennessee in 1791. He married Nancy Birdwell, who was born in Sullivan County, Tenn. on Nov. 3, 1795. She was the daughter of John Birdwell, born in Stafford County Virginia on Sept. 24, 1770. His father's name was George Birdwell. Nancy's mother was Mary Allen.

James and Nancy were married by Jack Cantaberry, a minister of the Gospel, at Huntsville, Ala. (Madison County) on May 14, 1812.

James Romine enlisted in Capt. James Reid's Company, Col. Steele's Reg. Tenn. Militia, War of 1812, on Jan. 28, 1814. He was engaged in guarding the frontier and scouting for Indians and was honorably discharged at Fort Deposit, Alabama, on April 28, 1814.

For his services in the War of 1812, James received a land grant from the government and entered land (Walker Co., Ala.) at Holly Grove, Ala. on Oct. 13, 1836 in Sec. 9, Tmshp 14, Range 9.

James and Nancy raised a large family at Holly Grove. Both died there and are buried at Townley, Ala. about one mile off Highway 78. James died Mar. 28, 1873 and Nancy died June 22, 1885.

Jesse was raised and grew to manhood, married and resided in his native State till 1817, when he, with his family, emigrated to Ohio, and soon after their arrival located in Massie Township where he resided till about 1853, when he moved to Grant County, Indiana, and there died the same year; his wife had died in Dec. 1822, while residing in Massie Township. They had six children, five now survive--Emily; Louisa now Mrs. D. Bradford, living in Grant Co., Ind.; Elizabeth, now Mrs. Smith; Cornelius, now in Grant Co., Ind., and Daniel. The subject of this sketch was but three weeks old when his mother died; thence, was taken by his grandfather Stump, and cared for till his death; thence was placed with his uncle, where he remained till 18 years of age; thence went out into the world for himself, working at whatever he found to pay him best until his majority; was married Aug. 12, 1843 to Elizabeth, daughter of William and Barbara Baker, natives of Kentucky; who had nine children; eight now survive--Mahala, now Mrs. House, living in Kansas; Minerva now Mrs. Burns, living in Illinois; Sarah Ann, now Mrs. Thomas, living in Ind; Elizabeth; Susan, now Mrs. Busby, living in Illinois; Rebecca, now Mrs. Haynes, living in Kansas; Mary and Martha (twins), Mary now Mrs. M. Thomas, living in Indiana; Martha now Mrs. Henderson also living in Indiana. Mr. Romine and wife have had four children, one only now survives--Jesse T., b. Sept. 3, 1848. Mr. Romine has devoted his life to farming in Clinton and Warren Counties; he bought and located upon the farm where he now lives in the Spring of 1864, where he has since resided. This place he purchased of Jonas Stump; it consists of 131 acres of excellent land, with good buildings and improvements, and is a pleasant home and farmer's residence. Mr. Romine started out in life a poor boy, "tossed from pillar to post," but possessed of a fund of energy and will, and by his own labor, industry and economy has accumulated a good competency, and is now one of the prominent and well-to-do farmers of Massie township, is a man of principle and integrity, a kind neighbor and an honest citizen.

Page 837 James G. Romine--South Bend Precinct, Cass Co., Nebr., was born in Rappahannock Co., Va. 4-30-1825, and was the second son of John and Maria (Romine) Romine, one of 10 children, 6 sons and 4 daughters. Most are residents of Virginia. James remained with his father until age 25, then entered the employ of one Crittendon as an overseer of slaves, with whom he remained two years at a salary of \$150 per year, and returned to his father until spring of 1852. He secured transportation for his trunk and started on foot with others over the Blue Ridge and Allegheny Mountains to Wheeling before the days of railroads and embarked on the steamboat "Reindeer" bound down the Ohio to Cairo, then up the Miss. and Mo. to St. Joseph, Mo., the latter part of May. He went to Savannah 17 miles from St. Joe and worked for Farmer Kleiser, an old Virginian with whom he sojourned 1 month for \$12. Then a partnership with G.D. Connelly (he met on way up river from St. Louis) and who was engaged in leather business, purchasing a tannery. They started in business selling boots and shoes, continued at this for 13 months

then selling out they went to Sciota, Montgomery Co., Ia. and farming and stock raising and running grocery and provision store for 2 years until fall of 1856. The partners sold out again and went to Cass Co. Nebr. farming and stock raising near Rock Bluff. In 1856 crossed Mo. Riv. at Plattsburgh with last of their cattle--great difficulty getting themselves and animals over--river full of mush ice. Connelly and Romine purchased from one Abraham Towner 320 acres for \$2,000. This they secured by pre-empting each a quarter section, paying Govt. \$1.25 per acre. A severe winter followed and the greater portion of their stock perished. In 1859 partnership was dissolved, each going into business for self. In Spring of 1861 Romine started freighting from Mo. to Rockies--headquarters Nebraska City until 1865. In meantime resumed partnership with McConnellly, which continued until they were "cleaned out" by Indians near Julesburg with loss \$27,000.

The savages made their raid about 1-7-1865, running off a portion of the stock, and in the meantime Mr. Romine and his men engaged in quite a skirmish with them. The night before the overland stage had arrived, and reported that they had been attacked by Indians about 2 miles east. There was a train of about 50 wagons owned by Keith & Cook, whose men were all well armed, and on the arrival of the coach all hands prepared for an attack at early dawn. Mr. Romine immediately sent two men to the post at Ft. Sedgwick, informing the commanding officer of the alarming reports, and received the following reply: "We have leard enough of these d----d Indian scares, and don't believe anything of it." By the time the messengers returned day was dawning. 4 men volunteered their services, and taking some of the best horses went to the point where the coach was attacked, where they found several hundred Indians, who killed 2 of the brave volunteers outright, and mortally wounded the third, who died soon after returning to the post. By daylight Romine and company discovered Indians all around them, and started off another messenger to Ft. Sedgewick, 2 miles west. The commanding officer at this point called out the troops, and attacked the Indians, followed them some 3 miles, the latter making a grand display just out of range of shots until they decoyed the troops into the bluffs, then turned on them, forcing them to retreat with a loss of 23 soldiers and citizens, the principal fight occurring very near the ranch. The wagon master of the train spoken of went into the fight, leaving orders that the teams be got in readiness to move at once.

A portion of them being ready when the stampede occurred, the men took the ready teams and struck for the fort, leaving a portion of their train to the mercy of the Indians. Mr. Romine and 4 men remained at the ranch. The Indians took possession of the stage station and a large amount of provisions. The commanding officer at the post rallied his men and opened fire with two mountain howitzers, and succeeded in driving the savages off for that day.

The Indians drove off all the stock of Romine and Company on the south side of the river, about 150 head, and near the last of February set fire to the ranch. That morning a squad of soldiers volunteered to go out as scouts and about 15 of Mr. Romine's men, with himself, repaired to the ranch after some hay. They had placed sentinels all around, and hearing a brisk firing up the road west, Mr. Romine being posted as a picket, while the men were loading hay, espied a band of Indians coming from the southwest, with the evident intention to cut off the retreat to the post.

Both horses, men and footmen now made preparations for flight with their horses and ponies, leaving the oxen with their wagons partially loaded. By means of a party from the post they managed to save the men on foot from death or capture. The Indians then took possession of the ranch, taking away with them whatever they desired, driving off the stock and setting fire to what was left.

In the retreat there was one Lieutenant and six men who were cut off from the rest and sought the ranch for protection, where the 7 men there by careful work and watching managed to save their scalps, Mr. Romine among the rest. After the Indians had taken the provisions from the stage station they tried to burn the ranch hay and other material by firing the grass.

In the fall of 1876 Mr. Romine put up his residence on his farm $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles south of South Bend. There being a fine spring upon the place, Mr. R conceived the idea of starting a fish pond, built a dam, and secured brook trout from Wisconsin. He was successful in this enterprise. In partnership with Mr. Ransom Decker, Mr. Romine established ponds, stocking them with brook trout. In the meantime he established a drug business at South Bend. Three years later they sold this fish interest to the State of Nebraska and this became the State Fish Hatchery.

A bachelor, at age 63 Mr. Romine said he saw his folly--all young men should seek a worthy member of the gentler sex.

She is a daughter of Stewart Wilson and Amanda (Stites) Wilson, residents of Parsippany, N.J. Mr. & Mrs. Wilson celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary on Jan. 9, 1914. He was a farmer & carpenter, now retired from active pursuits; and remembers distinctly the log cabin in which his parents lived when he was a boy and in which he was born. She is a descendant of the Moores, who came of a distinguished English family. Sir Thomas Moore, a wealthy shipbuilder of London, left three sons, one of whom came to this country and took service on the American side in the Revolutionary

KETOCTON BAPTIST CHURCH - Research by Elizabeth F. Morgan, Bluemont, Va.
Mar. 4, 1938

Located near the south end of Short Hill Mountain, in the western part
of the county.

Date: 1756, probably date of organization of church.

Historical Significance: This Church is situated near the south end of
Short Hill Mountain, in the western part of the county, is believed to
have been organized in 1756 by John Garrand, who with the Congregation of
Mill Creek, Berkeley, W.Va., refueged to Loudoun Co. about the same time
on account of the incursions of the Indians after the defeat of Braddock
in 1755.

They settled on Catocton Creek, in the neighborhood of the present church
building. In a "historic sketch" of this Church delivered before the
congregation in Nov. 1906, by the Rev. F.H. James, he says, "The earliest
extant record of this Church, that is record made by the Church, is
dated Aug. 3, 1776, a date at least twenty years subsequent to the found-
ing of the Church."

The Church building was certainly erected before Mar. 29, 1763, as the
deed for the lot on which it stood was made on that date by Nicholas
Osborn to Peter Romine and Henry Lloyd for the use of the Baptist Church
and recited that it is for the land "where the Church now stands." Mr.
James says the church was named "Ketocton", the Indian name for a stream
that flows nearby. Mr. John Garand was succeeded in the pastorate in
1760 by John Mark, who continued with the Church 27 years. * * *

Mr. James says "The first record in this church book gives the names of
fifty members as follows: * * * * Peter Romine and wife * * * ."

Narrative: William Romines came to the Snohomish community in 1872. He
was in the hotel business buy (sic) the hotel on Maple Street of John N.
Low for \$1,500. W.M. Packard occupied a part of the building as a store.
Romines ran the inevitable bar, but his future was to the opposite of
that * * *. In 1877, Romines bought the unfinished wharf above the
hotel, which was known as the Riverside, and erected a warehouse for
general merchandise and loggers' supplies. He sold this property within
a few months, however, and removed to a ranch near the mouth of the
Skykomish River. He did not prosper and by 1892 he had become a county
charge, although he was affectionately known as "Uncle Billy." His end
was hastened by his being struck by a railroad tricycle, then he was
walking on the track from the County Farm to Snohomish.

A Frederick Romines, aged 17, was left a minor in Jan. 1903 and Alexander
Spithill was appointed first and later J.E. Horan. The appraisers of the
estate of William Romines were E.A. Nickerson, W.W. Black, and E.D. Ward.
Both parents were dead. There was railroad right-of-way on list of pro-

OBITUARY - Rev. W. C. Romine - Roseville Times

Last week we announced the death of this aged citizen and minister of the Gospel. It is fitting that a fuller notice of his long and useful life should be made.

He was born in Butler Co., Ohio, Jan. 29th, 1816, and at the time of his death was nearly 75 years of age. He came to Illinois with his parents when a boy. In 1836 he was married to Miss Mary Osborn, to whom seven children were born. Four of these are living and three are dead.

In 1874 Father Romine was bereft of his wife. For 38 years she had been his faithful companion and helper. In the year 1876 he was married to Mrs. Ann Cage, who survives him.

At the Indiana State Library we found the name of Jesse Romine, buried Union Chapel Cemetery, Grant County, among a list of previously unrecognized Revolutionary War soldiers. This interested us so much that we stopped in Marion and attempted to locate the cemetery. Our time was limited and no one knew about it, and we proceeded to the Court House.

There we were assured that all of the old records (prior to about 1940) were just dumped in a pile on the floor in the attic and we'd need to "paw thru them" to find the old marriage records, deeds, wills, etc. This sounded quite unlikely, but we gave up and secured address of the American Legion. We had correspondence with Mr. James O. Eymmer of the Legion and quite forgot our problems at the Court House as Mr. Eymmer kept us informed of his search for the grave. Finally he found the old cemetery about 3 miles north of Marion on R. 9. The old headstone was in poor condition, but after "chalking" Mr. Eymmer was able to read the entire inscription.

The History of Kansas by Cutler, published by A.T. Andreas in 1883, gives this account of Charles William Romine "Farmer, Corning, Kansas. Born in 1830 in Jackson Co., Ohio, and is an early settler in Kansas, coming to this location in 1857 with his family. He bought the claim, which comprises his present fine farm, from C.M. Allison. * * * By good management and hard work have secured a valuable 200 acre farm and good home." Henry H. Romine made the "Cherokee Strip Run" on Sept. 16, 1893, and obtained land near Perry, Okla. On Feb. 13, 1901, Henry Hollister Romine married Nellie L. Smith of Centralia Mo. Children: Orpha Eunice b. 9-16-1902 in Kans., Wilber Roy b. 8-28-1904 in Kans. m. Hazel Frost on 2-16-1929, Joseph Frank b. 9-15-06 in Mo. m. Margery Keller on 12-1-1936, James Henry b. 5-17-1911 m. Mable Lee Winningham on 6-2-1941.

Mrs. Mildred Pettitt, Jerseyville, Illinois, states the above Mary Ann (Polly) Romine Wilson was her great grandmother. Mary Ann married Wilson Lewis 3-22-1832 but certified copy marriage record as Polly Romines-- in Jackson Co., Ohio.

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1880 Soundex

We advertised an index of about 75 pages, and we have therefore used some of the 1880 Soundex on the last 24 pages of this volume. Unfortunately lack of space excludes a number of states. The Romine Family, Book II, will contain the remainder of the Soundex. The present listing is from Eastern, Southern and Midwestern States and represents a good sampling.

Frequently we hear the question, "What is the Soundex?" At this time we can only state that it is the 1880 census of families with children age 10 and under. The names are coded (the Romine code is R-550) and we can quickly skim the microfilms and locate Romine families. Unfortunately there is no speedy way of skimming microfilms for Romine families with children above 10 and the childless families.
