* The Jefferson County Personal Property Tax records for 1787 are missing. The first available records are those of 1789; they are used here as a substitute. There is some confusion concerning these records. The microfilm reel [#8050] available from the Kentucky State Archives in Frankfort shows four lists for 1789—all of which are included here. After copying these, it was discovered that they had been published in 1924 in the *Register*, a publication of the Kentucky State Historical Society. The preface to the lists in the *Register* states that "it is unfortunate that the earlier lists which have been preserved do not include the town of Louisville nor the settlements on Harrod's Creek, but they are included in the lists for 1796 and '99". In an effort to determine how many of the lists for 1789 were missing, we conducted research in the Jefferson County Minute Books [published in *Jefferson County, Kentucky Records, Volume I* by Michael L. and Bettie A. Cummings Cook, Evansville, Indiana, 1987]. The results of this search follow:

(1) Minute Book #1, pg. 58 - September 4, 1787. Ordered that John Clark, Cadwallader Slaughter and William Shannon be appointed Commissioners for ascertaining certain taxes and duties. Clark's district to be all on the west side of the main road from Louisville to Bullitt's Lick, and at said Lick. Slaughter's district to be all on the west of Floyd's Fork, between the said fork and the main road. Shannon's district to be all on the east side of said fork.

(2) Minute book #1, pg. 115 - March 7, 1789. John Churchill appointed as Commissioner of the Tax, instead of John Clark, and to have the same District; Ransdale Slaughter appointed as Commissioner of the Tax in place of Cadwallader Slaughter, and to have the same District; Martin Daniel appointed in place of William Shannon and to have the same District.

(3) Minute Book #1, pg. 129 - October 6, 1789. Ordered That Francis R. Slaughter, Commissioner of the Tax, be allowed 20 dollars for 20 days services under Revenue Law; John Churchill to be allowed \$10 for 10 days services.

(4) Minute Book #1, pg. 131 - October 7, 1789. Coleman Daniel allowed 24 days for his acting as a Commissioner under the Revenue Laws.

(5) Minute Book #1, pg. 152 - April 8, 1790. John Churchill, on his motion, is excused from serving as a Commissioner of the Tax, and Jenkin Phillips is appointed in his place.

From the above, it seems evident that all lists for Jefferson County for 1789 are intact—the town of Louisville and the settlements on Harrod's Creek are not missing. It also appears that Jenkins Phillip's list [List D] could not have been taken in 1789 since he did not become a Commissioner until 1790. Since there is no 1790 list on the microfilm reel for Jenkins Phillips, it seems likely that the list which is clearly marked "1789" is somehow wrongly labeled, and it probably should be "1790". When one studies List "C" and "D" in this work, it is obvious that they covered the same territory. We have included List "D" because of the controversy which could arise as a result of it's being labeled "1789". It can also serve as a study for the migration during those years.

Inasmuch as the migration into and out of this county between 1787 and 1789 was great, it is certain that many persons who would have appeared in the 1787 lists of Jefferson County—if they were available—donot appear in the 1789 lists. To give a more accurate accounting, other records of Jefferson County for the latter part of 1786, all of 1787, and the first part of 1788 have been searched for the names of individuals who are not in the 1789 lists. These are included on pages 1479-1481.

SUMMARY DESCRIPTION

Ketoclin Baptist Church sits beyond a grove of mature oaks and evergreens adjacent to Ketoclin Church Road, two miles north of SR 7 and three miles east of Round Hill in western Loudoun County. Allder School Road borders the property to the north, and Ketoclin Church Road forms the boundary to the east. Farmland surrounds the church, which sits on approximately 18.75 acres of land at the base of the south end of Short Hill Mountain located just east of the Blue Ridge Mountains. The south fork of Catoclin Creek meanders through the north end of the property. Built in 1854, the Greek Revival-style church is believed to be the fourth meetinghouse to occupy the site. The single-story brick building laid in five-course American bond sits on a low uncoursed, rubble native fieldstone foundation and is topped by a standing-seam, front gable roof painted red with deep cornice returns. The rectangular block form of the church, measuring approximately forty feet by fifty-five feet, is similar to other meetinghouses built by congregations in the surrounding communities and across Virginia during the early to mid-nineteenth century. The floor plan consists of two entrance foyers on the south elevation with a small room in between, originally used as a library, and a large meeting room with an upper gallery on three sides. Above a raised platform centered on the north interior wall is a *trompe l'oeil* painting attributed to Lucien Whiting Powell, a local artist (1846-1930). The room includes furnishings that date to the early years of the church as well as other pieces placed there when the interior was beautified in the 1880s. The building is surrounded on the north and west sides by a cemetery, a contributing site, and contains graves from the eighteenth, nineteenth, twentieth, and twenty-first centuries including those of some Revolutionary War and Civil War soldiers. The earliest grave recorded dates to 1777. A stone wall composed mostly of native fieldstones, a contributing structure, encloses the older sections of the cemetery, and some family plots within the cemetery have stone walls as well. The Ketoclin Baptist Church and grounds have been well maintained and have retained their integrity during the near century and a half of the church's existence.

DETAILED DESCRIPTION

Exterior

A winding gravel road leads to Ketoclin Baptist Church which can be viewed through a grove of large oak trees, surrounded by rolling farmland and distant mountains. Few changes have been

The foundation of the church consists of uncoursed rubble, native fieldstone laid with mortar and is one-and-one-half feet thick. The crawlspace underneath the church has two additional rows of uncoursed rubble, native fieldstones laid with mortar, which provide support for the building and separate the space into three sections.

Interior

The interior of Ketoclin Baptist Church has been well maintained. The two entrance doors on the southern facade open into separate foyers, each measuring approximately twelve-and-one-half feet by six feet. The west entrance provides entry into the large meeting room as well as entry into a smaller room, originally used as the library, located between the two foyers.⁴ The door to the library appears to have its original hardware. The east entrance door provides entry into the large meeting room and to the gallery above through a boxed staircase. The stairs consist of two flights and one landing and has three-and-one-half-foot-wide treads and with eight-and-one-half-inch-tall risers. Tongue-and-groove beaded paneling, approximately seven and three quarters inches in width, encase the stairs. The side entrance door on the western elevation also leads to the gallery and has matching woodwork and a single-flight stairs. The interior doors leading to the main meeting room from the two foyers have shoulder surrounds seven inches in width topped by a two-inch border and the doors have two raised vertical panels with rising joint hinges. Baseboards in both foyers are seven inches wide and are topped by quarter-round molding. The ceiling slants down to accommodate the gallery above. Electric lighting has been added to these entrances and vinyl coverings placed on the floors.

The larger interior room used as the main meeting room is approximately twenty-two feet high. It is surrounded on three sides by a gallery, which is supported by seven pillars that taper from ten inches at the base to eight inches at their eight-foot height. The walls in this large room are plastered and painted pale green with a darker olive green wide crown molding. The ceiling was replaced in 1962 because of water damage.⁵ The floors have random-width pine boards ranging from approximately six to eight inches in width that have been stained. The wooden window sills measure one-foot in depth. A raised platform in a modified hexagon shape is centered on the north wall and measures twelve-feet-and-eleven-inches by nine-feet-and-seven-inches and is one-and-one-half feet in height.⁶ Above the altar is a *trompe-l'oeil* painting attributed to Lucien Whiting Powell, a local artist, around 1880.⁷ The painting is done in three-dimensional designs

and made of boards measuring eight to twelve inches wide. The seating is composed of wooden pews painted white with twelve-inch wide planks for the seat and one three-inch wide plank for the backs. The ends have v-notched legs. Nails with tin washers were observed in the benches.

The attic of Ketocin Baptist Church reveals that the roof has heavy timber frame construction. Five large beams, measuring approximately nine inches by six inches, run north to south and are placed two feet apart with joists measuring approximately two inches by six inches placed east to west between the timbers. Four queen post trusses, measuring approximately nine inches square, with pegged mortise-and-tenon joints and tilted purlins, measuring approximately five inches square, provide support for the roof rafters, which have a pegged half-lap joint at the apex. The sheathing consists of random-width boards spaced apart to accommodate the metal roof, the first of which was added in 1876.¹⁰

Landscape

A stone wall built in 1963¹¹ with uncoursed native fieldstones and mortar borders the church property along Ketocin Church Road and provides two entrances each with stone pillars sitting on each side of the circle driveways in front of the church. A recently installed split-rail fence outlines the property to the south and west. The cemetery, a contributing site, is located to the north and west sides of the church and most of the graves are surrounded by an uncoursed, rubble native fieldstone wall, a contributing structure, most of which is believed to have been built in the late 1800s.¹² Much of the stone wall has been repointed and additional mortar has been added to the top of the wall in a delta-shaped cap to help shed water. Part of possibly the original wall topped with dry-laid fieldstones exists at the northeast corner of the wall. Within the surrounding wall are several enclosed family plots that also have stone walls, two made with native fieldstones and another with concrete formed blocks with an adjacent cast-iron fence. A stone placed at the entrance gate to the Heaton's private burying ground bears the date 1825. A marble slab inscribed "J. Hatcher & G.G. Gregg 1875" is located in the wall of a private plot on the southwest side of the church. On the west side of the church, the double entrance gate has a stone bearing the date 1917. Two cast-iron gates provide separate entrances into the cemetery on the east and double iron gates provide entrance on the west. The cemetery contains graves from the eighteenth, nineteenth, twentieth, and twenty-first centuries. There are over six hundred burials in the cemetery, and the oldest grave recorded dates to 1777. Some markers are made from

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The name Ketocin has been spelled a variety of ways throughout the years. The name was taken from the Indian word for the stream that flows nearby and is reputed to mean "the ancient wooded hill." Records indicate that when the church was constituted in 1751, the church was named Ketocin. Since 1886 the spelling has been changed to Ketocin.³

Land grants for Loudoun County were made by Thomas, Sixth Lord Fairfax and some of the earliest settlers appeared in 1731-33.⁴ John Covill received a land patent in 1741, a portion of which later became the site for Ketocin Baptist Church.⁵ This part of Virginia east of the Blue Ridge Mountains was originally part of Stafford County established in 1664. The county was divided several times, forming Prince William County in 1731, Fairfax County in 1742 and Loudoun County in 1757.⁶

Several denominations preceded the Baptists in establishing churches in Loudoun County. Among them were the Anglicans, Quakers, Presbyterian, and Lutheran congregations.⁷

Records indicate that the Baptists in Virginia originated from three sources. "The first were emigrants from England, who, about the year 1714 settled in the southeastern parts of the State (the General Baptists). About 1743 another party came from Maryland and formed a settlement in the northwest (the Regular Baptists) . . . A third party (the Separate Baptists or New Lights) came from New England."⁸ Ketocin Baptist Church was formed from the second group.

In 1750 Owen Thomas and Benjamin Miller from the Philadelphia Baptist Association were appointed "to write a letter to some people in Fairfax, County, Virginia, in behalf of the association."⁹ The Philadelphia Baptist Association was founded in Pennsylvania in 1707 to provide leadership for the Baptist movement in the colonies.¹⁰ The association appointed Thomas and Miller "to travel to Virginia pursuant to two applications," one from the Mill Creek General Baptist Church in Frederick County (now in Berkeley County, West Virginia) and the other from Ketocin.¹¹ Both churches were received into the association in 1754.¹² Several records indicate that John Thomas of Montgomery County, Pennsylvania, helped to organize the Ketocin Baptist Church and was its first missionary pastor.¹³ Later the church extended an invitation to John Gano who had accompanied Thomas on one of his visits. Gano accepted ordination and traveled to Virginia.¹⁴ These two missionary preachers provided services to the Ketocin Church through the mid-1750s.¹⁵

enlisted in the Continental Army.”²³ It is believed that meetings for the revolutionary cause may have been held at Ketocin Baptist Church.

Ketocin Baptist Church has been served by twenty-three ministers. Dr. Isaac B. Lake served the longest period of time – 1872-1921. A plaque bearing the names of the ministers has been placed on the south wall of the meeting room.

The *trompe l'oeil* mural on the north interior wall of the church is attributed to Lucien Whiting Powell, a local artist, who was born in 1846 and raised at Levinworth Manor, the Loudoun County estate of his father, John Levin Powell. Through the encouragement of his mother who recognized his artistic talents, Lucien Powell studied art at the Philadelphia Academy of Fine Arts under Thomas Moran. Although he is known for his landscape paintings, Powell did many other works as well. The Ebenezer Baptist Church in Loudoun County, placed on the National Register in 1994, also has a *trompe l'oeil* mural done by him around the same time. Powell's work was admired by many including Theodore Roosevelt and J. Edgar Hoover. Although he settled in the Washington, D.C. area, he acquired a summer home in Loudoun County near where he had grown up and named it Powellton [Airmont]. The building that housed his studio still exists there today.²⁴

The cemetery, a contributing resource, of Ketocin Baptist Church is the burial ground for four centuries of families and individuals ranging from early settlers of Loudoun County to present day members of the community. It contains the graves of former pastors, Revolutionary War soldiers and Civil War soldiers. Most of the markers in the older sections of the cemetery face east as was the custom of the early churches. Some family plots have been set off separately from the others within the cemetery by stone walls, concrete blocks, iron fencing, and low concrete dividers. Since the 1950s the church and grounds have been under the care of the Ketocin Baptist Church Board of Trustees appointed by the court of Loudoun County.

As the wind continues to whisper through the giant oaks, the Ketocin Baptist Church and its cemetery reveal a story about the importance of this place in the hearts and lives of the people of Loudoun County.

The west gable end contains only a pair of six-over-six sash, double-hung windows at the level of the upper gallery like those in the east gable end. From the scars in the stonework, however, it appears that two former openings have been closed in. What was probably a window opening in the center of the west wall has been closed in. What looks to be a closed-in door opening is found in the northwest corner.

There are four openings on the north side of the building - three six-over-six sash, double-hung windows and a single door. The door is at the northeast corner of the building and provides the only access to the upper gallery.

On the interior, the church is one large room with plastered sheetrock walls and ceiling and uncarpeted hardwood floors. The upper gallery runs the full width of the building at the east end of the room, directly over the entrance. The face of the upper gallery is clad in horizontal boards with a narrow batten nailed over the joint between the boards. Two wooden posts support the upper gallery from the floor of the church. Tie rods and a tie beam span the width of the meeting space between the front and the back of the church.

A 1973 interior photograph of the church, in the archives of the Department of Historic Resources, shows the ghost of a former upper gallery on the west wall of the church along with the ghost of an access stair rising from the northwest corner. In that photograph some cracking of the plaster is visible where a center window opening would have been and where the door providing gallery access would have been, corresponding with the scars still visible in the exterior stonework. The evidence of these earlier openings is no longer visible because the original plaster has been removed.

An architectural survey report from the early 1970s on file at the Department of Historic Resources suggests one or two theories about the upper gallery. The surveyor speculated that either there were once galleries at either end of the room and the one on the west end was removed, or, that the gallery was originally at the west end of the room and was moved to the east end.

The minutes for the church on file in the Virginia State Library and Archives cover the period 1804 to 1896, but include only a few scattered references to the church building itself and offer nothing conclusive about the gallery. The minutes show that a proposal to erect a gallery was rejected in 1804 in favor of finishing the meeting house "on the plan it was begun." In January of 1805 the membership voted that the "meeting house should be left in a frame, that a gallery hereafter might be erected." The records do not, however, provide clues as to when that gallery was erected, where it was placed or whether it was later moved. A fire in the northwest corner of the church may have been the reason for the removal or relocation of the western gallery. The evidence of the fire was uncovered during the restoration work at the church in the 1970s.

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reveals are paneled. Two six-over-six sash, double-hung windows are placed directly over the entrance doors and provide light for the upper gallery.

The entrance doors lead into a vestibule that is about 12 feet deep and extends the entire width of the front of the building. Access to the upper gallery is provided by an enclosed winding stair in the southwest corner of the vestibule. Paneled interior doors topped by three-light transoms are directly opposite the entrance doors and provide access to the sanctuary.

The sanctuary is one large room with a tongue-and-groove board ceiling painted a soft blue-green and plastered walls painted a pale blue-grey. Two carpeted side aisles lead from the interior doors to a dais at the front of the church. The carpeting covering the aisles and the dais is a neutral grey. Facing the front of the church are eight rows of simple wooden pews, arranged between the two aisles and along the sides of the church.

The lectern is set on a platform raised three steps from the dais. A set of carpeted steps leads to the platform from both the right and left sides of the dais. The platform is painted to look as if it is paneled. On either side of the lectern is a slightly tapered wooden pier holding a tall brass gas lamp with an etched glass globe and a shorter pier holding a simple brass candelabrum. The fronts and sides of the piers are painted to resemble carved panels, some of which are in the shape of a Gothic arch.

A pair of straight wooden chairs and a simple table sit on the dais in front of the lectern platform. Behind the lectern is an upholstered Victorian-style sofa. Three straight wooden benches are arranged in both the northeast and northwest corners of the church facing the dais. An electric organ sits in front of the steps to the right of the pulpit; an old-fashioned pump organ to the left of the pulpit faces the back of the church.

Two cast-iron stoves once used for heating, but now without their stove pipes, are found on either side of the church between the first and second windows at the head of the ranks of pews. On either side of the church a pew with its back to the lectern faces each stove and the forward-facing pew on the other side of the stove. A flat bench along the wall on either side of the church connects the facing pews and forms a C-shaped seating arrangement around each stove.

The upper gallery runs the width of the building at the south end of the room. Two square wooden columns support the gallery from the floor. A gaslight wall lamp with glass globe hangs on each of the columns. The face of the gallery is composed of horizontal wooden panels decorated with carving in a Greek key motif. The panels are painted white. The top rail of the gallery and the rail on which the panels rest, as well as the divisions between each panel, are painted a mocha brown. In the gallery are several rows of straight backed wooden pews; the wooden floor is not carpeted.

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The wall surrounding the old cemetery probably was erected after 1804, when the will of John Butcher, oldest son of Samuel Butcher, Sr., gave the use of his plantation, upon the death of his wife to "the church formerly called Butcher's meeting house, but now called Ebenezer" to be rented out with 100 pounds of the rent money to be put toward a wall to enclose the cemetery.

The old cemetery contains about 235 gravestones. The oldest marker appears to date from ca. 1800; the most recent is dated 1905. Most of the stones are simple markers with rounded or scalloped tops. Many of the stones in the cemetery date from the 1840s, '50s and '60s.

The Ebenezer Cemetery Company, Inc., which cares for the churches and the cemeteries, has prepared a listing of the inscriptions on the gravestones in the old cemetery. One of the markers is for the grave of Elder Charles Polkinhorn, a minister of the Old School Baptist order. The cemetery also contains the grave of a Civil War soldier who died from wounds received at the Battle of Ball's Bluff in October of 1861.

The Ebenezer Cemetery Company was incorporated on April 29, 1887. Land for the new cemetery was deeded to the Ebenezer Cemetery Company in 1888 and the first burial there occurred in that year. The new cemetery has been in continuous use since 1888, with additional land being acquired as needed. The new cemetery contains about 1700 graves marked by a variety of older style and more modern gravestones and obelisks with dates ranging from 1888 until the present. At least one of the stones is a five-foot monument styled to resemble a tree trunk. Marking the grave of Henry G. Smallwood (died in 1918), it is topped with a World War I Army infantryman's hat; a rifle leans against the tree trunk and a canteen rests at the base along with a flower pot holding vegetation that climbs up the "tree." The cemetery contains the graves of two other World War I soldiers, the grave of a Spanish American War soldier and the graves of about 30 Confederate veterans who were buried there between 1897 and 1929.

The Ebenezer Cemetery Company has prepared an index of the pre-1940 graves in the new cemetery. Organized by date of death, plot number, and surname, the index is a useful research tool.

The Old Ebenezer Church was transferred to the Ebenezer Cemetery Company in 1934, there being no congregation using the church by that time. In 1941, the Cemetery Company's charter was revoked for non payment of taxes during the previous two years and it is assumed that by that date there was no longer any congregation using the New Ebenezer Church.

The Ebenezer Cemetery Company was re-incorporated in December 1959 to care for the two cemeteries and both of the churches. Since that time the Ebenezer Cemetery Company has carried out restoration work on both of the churches as well as on the walls surrounding the cemeteries. Work continues to be done as funds are available.

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death, with one hundred pounds to be put towards building a wall around the cemetery. John Butcher also willed his "Negro Daniel to be rented out or hired until he earns one hundred pounds . . . to [be] put to the use of said meeting house . . . and then I will Negro Daniel to be set free." Finally, the will identified 60 pounds to be applied to a free school at Butcher's Meeting House. No further information on a school at the meeting house, other than the two references in Butcher family wills, has been found.⁴

The whole of the senior Samuel Butcher's holdings passed from his wife, Susanna, to his son, Samuel Butcher, Jr., when he reached age 21. It was Samuel Butcher, Jr., who by indenture dated January 16, 1834, deeded those same two acres "on which the house called the Ebenezer Meeting house now stands" to two trustees of the Ebenezer Meeting House "as a place of worship for the Baptist Society in the neighborhood."⁵

Beginning in the 1830s differences in philosophy began to divide many Baptist congregations in the State. Church leaders and members were divided in thought concerning the appropriateness of Sunday schools, music in the worship service, reform and missionary movements, and Bible societies. Congregations accepting these new ideas and practices and favoring more independence of members were referred to as "New School Baptists"; those rejecting them were referred to as "Old School" or "Primitive" Baptists because they adhered only to what they believed to be the practices of the primitive church, or the church as described in the Bible.

The church minutes for Ebenezer reflected this growing controversy beginning in 1833 when eight members of the congregation requested dismissal from the church, charging the membership with not acting independently in the choice of a pastor and to being "blindly led by the influence of priestcraft." This "minority" was excluded from the fellowship of the church and apparently formed a separate congregation. The group dismissed from Ebenezer aligned themselves with the New School Baptists; the remainder considered themselves Old School Baptists. In December of 1833 the church minutes indicate that one of the excluded members had applied to a pastor to preach for the them at "this place" (Ebenezer). Subsequent entries in the minutes describe the need to meet with counsel concerning the meeting house and land.⁶

These events explain the language used by Samuel Butcher, Jr. in January 1834 when he deeded the meeting house property to the Trustees of the Ebenezer Meeting House. The indenture includes the following guidance:

inasmuch as difference of sentiment amongst the Baptists, have arisen, . . . which ought not to be the cause of separation between Brethren, it is not intended that one party so differing in sentiment shall use and enjoy the property herein conveyed to the exclusion of the other party, but the said Trustees are . . . hereby authorized . . . to permit any party of Baptists whom they . . . consider of good order and good Standing in the society, to use and enjoy the said property for the purpose of Worship, provided that no

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in the area. A local Civil War historian, John Divine, notes that Ebenezer Church would have been on the route of withdrawal from the Greenback Raid and could well have been the secluded spot where the spoils were divided.

Whether or not Col. Mosby's exploits included Ebenezer Church directly, this area of Loudoun County suffered from continued military activity during the years of the Civil War. There are no minutes for the church business meetings between September 1861 and July 1865. A note follows the latter entry and states that the "church has not met together for upwards of three years and the cause thereof was the war . . . the armies of both sides being in the neighborhood and our pastor being a prisoner nearly the whole of the above time."¹² Sympathizers with the Southern cause were frequently imprisoned by Federal troops in an effort to drain support from operators like Mosby.

Following the Civil War, Robert C. Leachman, Joseph L. Pennington, and J. N. Badger, in succession, served as pastors of the Old Church. In 1869 the minutes indicate that a committee was appointed to find out the cause of the "colored members of this church absenting themselves from among us." Like most Baptist churches, from its constitution in 1804 Ebenezer's membership had been both black and white, with all men and women being received in the same way, either by baptism or upon submission of a letter from another church. As late as 1888 the minutes show that "colored" members were still being accepted.¹³

The minutes for the Old School Baptist Church at Ebenezer cover the period from 1804 to 1896. Members of the Ebenezer Cemetery Company who now care for the church estimate that services were discontinued at the Old Church around the turn of the century. It was 1934 when the Cemetery Company took title to the Old Church and became responsible for its upkeep.

The New Ebenezer Church

The New Ebenezer Church was built on three-quarters of an acre of land deeded by William Galleher and his wife to trustees for the Ebenezer Church (New School Baptist) in September 1855. The exact date of construction is not known but the building's Greek Revival style suggests a date not much later than 1855. No minutes of business meetings for this congregation have been found. It appears likely that the New Church was constituted soon after 1833 when eight members were dismissed from the Old Ebenezer Church after expressing their philosophical differences with the majority of the congregation. Until 1855 the New School Baptist congregation of the Ebenezer church apparently met in the Old Church.

The interior of the New Church presents a striking contrast to the austere interior of the Old Church and emphasizes one of the differences between Old School and New School Baptist churches. The interior of the New Church is marked by use of color and decoration. The dominating feature of the interior of the New Ebenezer Church is the tromp l'oeil painting

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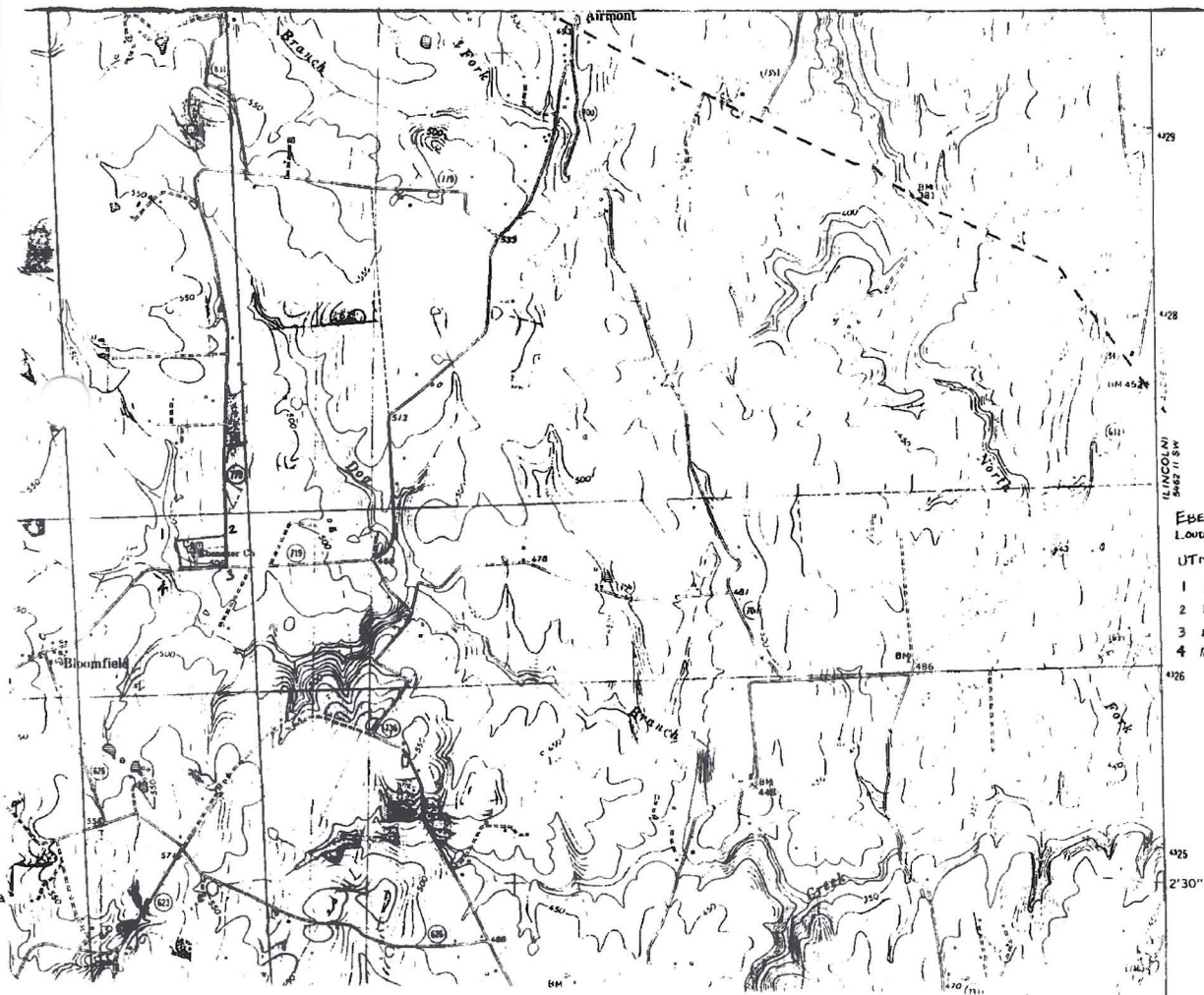
